Ottawa, Jan. 24.—Dominion headquarters of the employment service of Canada, department of labor, reports another substantial decrease in employment during the wek ended December 31, when it was reported by 4,727 firms that they had released 45,214 persons, a contraction of more than seven per cent. in the pay rolls. Firms in four industrial groups recorded additions to their payrolls aggregating 347 employes while, in twenty-nine groups there were decreases totalling 45,361 workers.

A large part of these declines was of a temporary nature, indicating shut down for holiday's and inventories.
