HOLD-UPS ADDED TO LIST OF CRIMES

Stirring Life of New York City.

(N. Y. Evening Times.)

New York's crime wave continued undiminished yesterday. Two hold-ups, one of which will probably end fatally, were added to the usual long list of minor robberies and thefts.

Two men held up Mrs. Thomas W. Edgar in Central Park about 7 o'clock last night. Mrs. Edgar was on her way to dinner party at the Hotel Commodore in a car sent to fetch her by her husband, a physician of 766 West End Avenue.

As the taxicab approached Eighty-first Street on the West Side, going at a fair rate of speed, it suddenly slowed down. As it came abreast of a clump of bushes it stopped, and two men, both apparently well dressed, stepped forward and ignoring the chauffeur, opened the door of the car.

Thrillingly, Mrs. Edgar to alight. She stepped into the road the smaller of the two men tore her earrings from her ears and when she was too slow in removing her gloves to suit him ripped these down and pulled her rings off. She was permitted to keep her wedding ring, although she lost an engagement ring valued at \$8,000 and a diamond ring valued at \$1,000.

Mrs. Edgar was also forced to give up her handbag, containing about \$15. Even her stockings were searched and her dress torn before the robbers were satisfied that they had missed nothing.
