Year's Shipbuilding Sets World's Record

American Yards Turned Out 1,956,455 Tons in Last 12 Months, Greatest in History

Washington, Sept. 30.—American shipyards established a new world's record by bringing the total construction for the twelve months since Sept. 26, 1917, up to 1,956,455 gross tons. The previous world's record for twelve months was made by the British government during the calendar year 1918, when 1,692,133 gross tons were launched. The figures in connection with this remarkable record, which placed the United States unquestionably in the lead as the greatest shipbuilding nation, were supplied by the Bureau of Commerce, the Department of Commerce.

The construction figures, like those of the British Admiralty on which the 1918 British record was based, include all construction of over 100 gross tons. All of the American ships included in the total announced have been officially numbered by the bureau. There apparently is no further reason to doubt that the output of the American yards will increase rapidly from this time and that a much larger total will be turned out during the twelve months to come. All of the officials are agreed that the United States will not, from this time, relinquish its place as the leading shipbuilding nation.

E. T. Chamberlain, Commissioner of Navigation, set forth the facts in this memorandum which he sent today to Chairman Hurley of the Shipping Board.

"We have gone 'over the top' this morning in shipbuilding. In the twelve months ended just now (10 a. m., Sept. 26), American shipyards have built and the Commerce Department, Bureau of Navigation, has officially numbered 1,956,455 gross tons, passing the previous high record of the United Kingdom for 1918 calendar year, 1,692,133 gross tons.

His observer now came into the running, and opening fire, sent one of the following enemy machines spinning earthward. Having cleared the jam the pilot, anxious to make up for his lost time, manoeuvred at furious speed, and succeeded in getting a third German across his front, where he opened fire at short range and sent his opponent spinning down, a burning mass.

Raid on Hun Drome. The same day a highly successful raid was carried out on a German air-drome by combined British and American squadrons. Successive formations, flying very low, released their bombs on hangars, machines on the ground, and hutments. Six machines on the ground were destroyed by fire and two more by direct hits; two large Gothas and several smaller hangars were enveloped in flames.

tons launched, of which 1,793,287 gross completed. (Lloyd's returns.)

The United States for twenty months to date completed 1,956,455 gross tons and the United Kingdom for eleven months ended Aug. 31 completed 1,612,640 gross tons. Together 3,569,095 tons completed exceed the world's record, 3,282,822 gross tons, launched by all nations in the calendar year 1917.

It is believed that within a short time the output of the American yards will be considerably in excess each month of the total sinkings by German submarines, including the allied and neutral ships destroyed.

Extensive preparations are being made to man the new ships. The Navy Department is training 22,000 officers and 200,000 men to place on ships which are turned over by the Shipping Board to the War Department. These ships will be used as transports and for the carrying of munitions and other supplies. Board, an additional 4,000 men are being trained each month as civilian crews to man ships in other service.

Allyed Airmen Prove Supremacy

Incredible Feats of Stetial Endurance and Plucky Combats

The official communiques, dealing as they do with hundreds of miles of fighting fronts, present broad results and necessarily omit individual efforts. Even in the case of a single service, the Royal Air Force, it is impossible to record one hundredth part of the incidents which are included in its average daily work. Here, however, are a few typical specimens, given in the London Chronicle, culled from the latest records to hand.

A two-seater machine was engaged in special work when it was attacked by seven German machines, which surrounded it, firing from all sides. The Germans, acting up to their reputation, used explosive bullets. Fighting gallantly against these crashing odds, the British pilot battled his way through the enemy formation. In the course of the fight, however, one of his legs was hit five times, so that the limb was all but severed, and fell among the controls. By the sort of effort that twentieth century men were supposed to be incapable of making, the pilot clung grimly to consciousness, and somehow managed to disentangle his leg from the controls. Not only so, but, with teeth hard set in white lips, he succeeded in landing the machine safely behind the British lines.
