### THE ELM STREET SCHOOL

St. John, N. B., Feb. 13, 1914.  
To the Editor of the "Times":  
Sir—Referring to an item in our daily papers containing the news that certain of the school buildings in this city could not be heated during the recent cold snap, and more particularly the Dufferin school in Elm street, North end, it does seem rather strange that a modern, up-to-date building like the Dufferin school, costing, as it did, many thousands of dollars, should be deficient in the matter of heat.

The building should have a heating apparatus capable of keeping every room warm and comfortable in the most severe weather. Evidently this is not the case, and why?

There are a number of reasons that suggest themselves, and perhaps the board of school trustees could answer a couple of them.

Are the boilers too small? Or does the janitor not keep sufficient fire going to create the necessary amount of heat? Can the board explain what is the reason?

Nobody finds fault about Newman street school. It is an old, out-of-date building, heated with stoves, and naturally it is difficult to get a uniform heat; but the writer can see no excuse for not being able to keep the Dufferin school quite comfortable in the coldest weather.
