MEXICO

Washington, Aug. 5.—That no announcement of policy or further steps will be taken by President Wilson in the Mexican situation until former Governor John Lind of Minnesota, personal representative of the president, arrives in Mexico City, and familiarizes himself with conditions there was made clear at the White House today.

Mr. Lind carries instructions to talk informally with prominent Mexicans. Washington officials indicated that no steps toward a mediation policy would be attempted until after Mr. Lind had sounded sentiment in Mexico and determined whether or not the assistance of the United States in adjusting the dispute would be received.

Mr. Lind will inform inquirers on the authority of President Wilson that only the governor's constitutionally set up would be recognized by the United States. This will involve the resignation of Provisional President Huerta in favor of the provisional president selected by Mexican factions, the new president to be first supreme minister of foreign relations, in conformity with the law of succession in Mexico.

It was pointed out in administration circles today that while Mr. Lind's position now is that of adviser to the American embassy he will act in reality as an ambassador, to be named ambassador when a stable government is organized and recognition is extended by the United States.

Mexico City, Aug. 5.—Strong belief prevails here that the course of action taken by the United States administration is unwise and that so far from reconciling opposing factions the more probable result will be to make the existing confusion worse.

General Huerta has emphatically declared that he will neither resign nor accept mediation and it is feared that President Wilson's peace emissary will make little or no impression upon him until the United States makes formal recognition of his government.

AMERICAN WOMAN ROBBED IN ITALY OF JEWELS WORTH \$3,200 Florence, Aug. 5.—Jewelry to the value of \$3,200 was stolen yesterday from the apartment of Miss Blood, an American residing in Florence, who is a friend of Princess Chica, sister of former Queen Natalie of Serbia.

She Queen Natalie of Serbia. She is the home of the princess, for this season. The apartment was ransacked in the absence of Miss Blood and the safe opened. The key had been obtained by means of a forged letter. The fact that the hand was concerned in the robbery was shown when a letter, telling of the plot, was found in the apartments.

BANK OF MONTREAL TO MAKE OVER ITS ST. JOHN OFFICES

Will Have Handsome Business Place—Temporary Quarters in Old Bank of Nova Scotia

The Bank of Montreal quarters in this city are to be completely renovated and in the meantime the bank will conduct its business in the former offices of the Bank of Nova Scotia in Prince William street.

The whole arrangement of the main floor will be changed; the present partitions will be torn down and instead of the offices being in centre as they are now they will be arranged about the side and the centre of the floor will be left open to the public. At the left as one enters will be the public waiting room and in order will follow the booths of the paying teller, the receiving teller, savings teller, the ledger, discounts and accountant. The manager's office will be in about the same position as at present.

All the fixtures of the bank quarters will be changed and the new fixtures will be of the most up-to-date and approved bank pattern, and of mahogany. The present arrangement of the space will also be completely changed. Large toilet rooms done in marble will be installed. There will be a large fan room to supply ventilation throughout the upstairs office.

Operations in the present plans a part of the Merchants' Bank building next door will also be taken into the Montreal Bank quarters.
