

IN MEXICO

Washington, Aug. 5—That no announcement of policy or further steps will be taken by President Wilson in the Mexican situation until Former Governor John Lind of Minnesota, personal representative of the president, arrives in Mexico City, and familiarizes himself with conditions there was made clear at the White House today.

Mr. Lind carries instructions to talk informally with prominent Mexicans. Washington officials indicated that no steps toward a mediation policy would be attempted until after Mr. Lind had sounded sentiment in Mexico and determined whether or not the assistance of the United States in adjusting the dispute would be received.

Mr. Lind will inform inquirers on the authority of President Wilson that only the government constitutionally set up would be recognized by the United States. This will involve the resignation of Provisional President Huerta in favor of the provisional president selected by Mexican factions, the new president to be first apopinted ministy of foreign relations, in conformity with the law of succession in Mexico.

It was pointed out in administration circles today that while Mr. Lind's position now is that of adviser to the American embassy he will act in reality as an ambassador, to be named ambassion when a stable government is organized and recognition is extended by the United States.


