WATER LEAK FOUND. A month's patient work on the part of the water department was rewarded this morning when the men at work found the leak in the 24-inch water main in Fernhill which has been causing trouble for several years. Wall Street Notes.

New York, Sept. 26.—Americans in London steady 18-14 up. Settlement concludes today. J. P. Morgan will not appear before the senate committee on contributions until October 4 or 5. President Taft of the Reading yesterday said no danger of coal famine; production above normal. Copper tonnage booked this week estimates at 90,000,000 pounds. A fairly large amount of gold is expected to be engaged in London early next week. The banks have lost heavily this week to the sub-treasury. Railroads will report large gains in earnings from this time on. They are using every ray to take care of their business. Bonds show some improvement and this is considered encouraging. The money stringency operates as a check, but the banks are very conservative and have called loans freely, thus leaving the situation well in hand. As money has to be borrowed today for over Sunday, fully 7 p. c. is expected and very likely 7 p. c. will be seen. An irregular market can be looked for subject to the money fluctuations. 
