

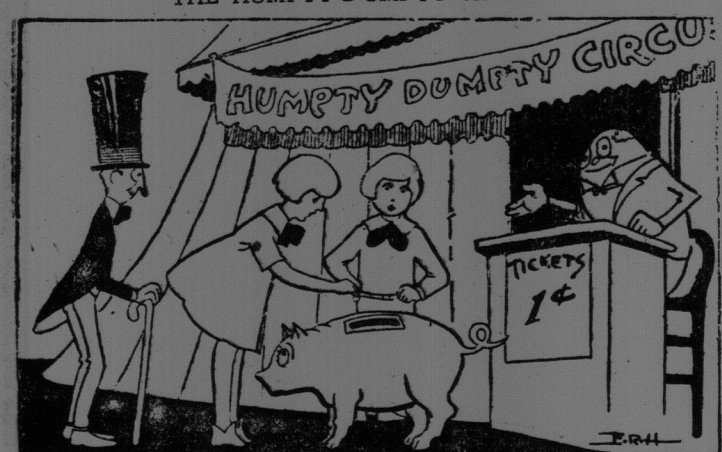

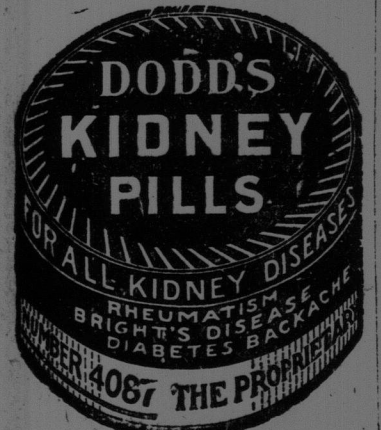

## LODGE HAS BIRTHDAY PARTY.

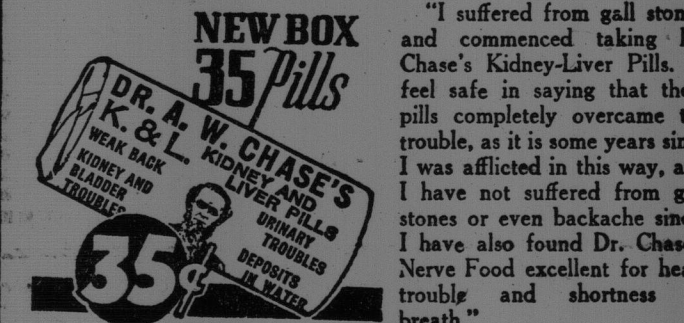

## CALL IT A BLOW TO CHURCH UNION

Montreal, April 2.—Strong feeling has been aroused in Montreal among Methodists, Presbyterians and Congregationalists in favor of church union over the action of the private bills committee of the Ontario Legislature in amending the Church Union so that congregations of any of the three churches concerned may vote themselves out of union, and at the same time retain their congregational property. It is contended that this amendment virtually destroys the bill and effects the whole country.

Ottawa, April 2.—Canadian National Railway officials are entitled to the same degree of privacy regarding their salaries as obtains in any other part of the business world, the board of management of the railway suggests in declining to submit a list to be tabled in the House of Commons of all its employees receiving \$4,000 a year or over in wages. The list was asked for by A. J. Doucet (Conservative, Kent, N. B.), and the answer of the board was tabled today in the House.

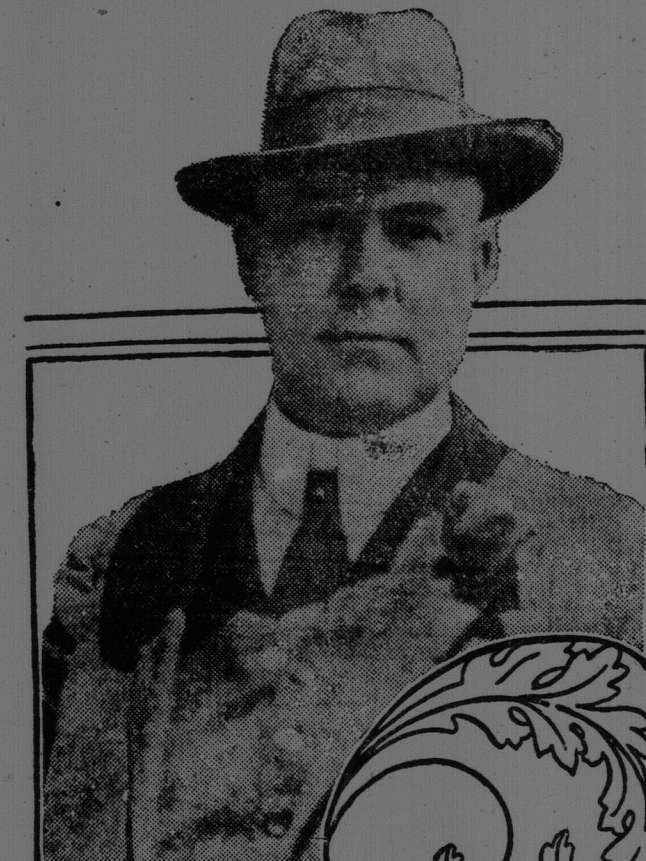

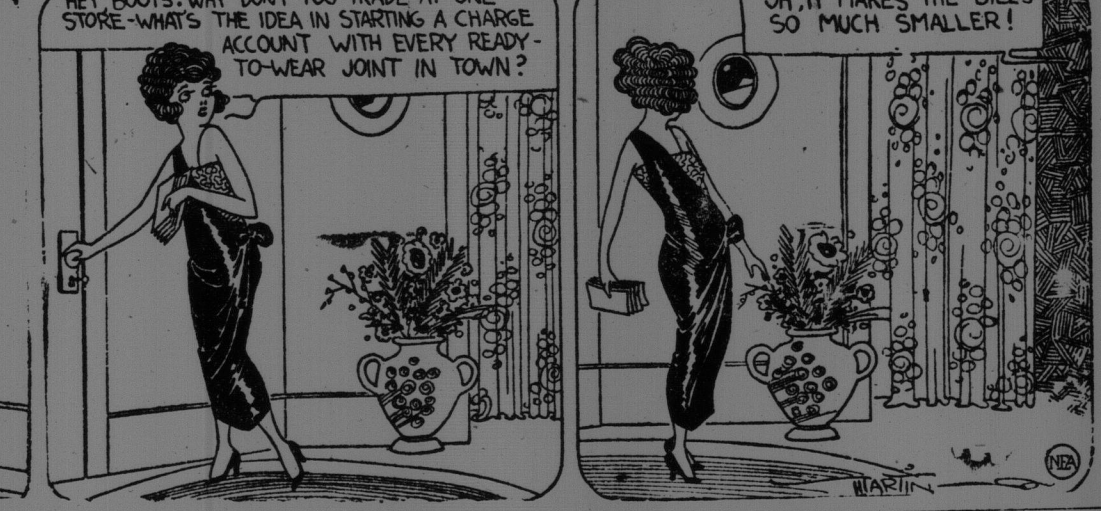
