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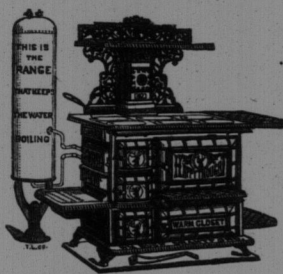

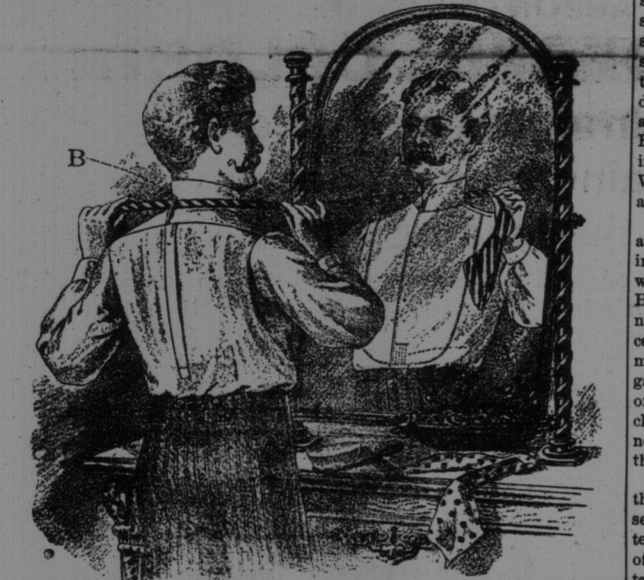

A Sensational Day in the Equity Court.

A. H. HANINGTON HEARD FROM.

HE DEFIES THE JUDGE AND READS A STATEMENT.

Preferential Charges Against Judge Palmer—A Plain Statement from the Receiver of the Cotton Mills to the Hon. Mr. Justice Palmer.

In the Equity court this morning a somewhat unexpected scene was presented, when Mr. A. H. Hanington, as soon as the court convened, arose and said he wished to make a statement.

He then read a statement, formulating divers complaints, protests, charges and allegations reflecting on the conduct of the Hon. Mr. Justice Palmer as judge in equity and in relation to the suit of Weldon et al v. Parks & Son (limited) et al.

One complaint is that orders are made and proceedings taken from day to day in the absence of Mr. Hanington and without notice to the defendants. Mr. Hanington contends that his Honor had no authority or right to appoint a receiver in the case and that such appointment was without the consent and against the wish of the bondholders of the St. John Cotton Company and that the receiver's certificates have been issued in violation of the law.

He says he is informed it is untrue that the mills are making money and that no charges are made for interest, wear and tear, etc. He complains of Mr. Melville's statement and contends, without consent of the bondholders, that his Honor nor the receiver has any right to use the mill and machinery for any purpose, and that the receiver is not to be allowed to pay the interest on the bonds.

He also complained that when he denied the court the statement that he was representing the Montreal syndicate and while the identical words he used were published, many of the words used by him were not published, and that he was withholding what he considered his Honor intended yesterday that the proceedings in this case were investigated by the Montreal Cotton syndicate under the name of the receiver of the St. John Cotton Company.

That the suit came in court for foreclosure by consent of William Parks & Son (limited) and that he did them and does still protest against it on behalf of the bondholders.

THE UPPER PROVINCES. SALARIES FOR ONTARIO POLITICAL LEADERS.

At present Judge Burleigh is the sole Excise judge but the government is anxious and the volume of business is increasing every year.

It is proposed that the judges shall go on circuit and hear in a body here for the purpose of hearing appeals from individual judgments of members of the court.

It is also contemplated that the admiralty jurisdiction shall be given the same court.

The present judges of the admiralty court will therefore be displaced on the 1st of July.

Troop & McLaughlin, a counter suit for damages will be brought against them.

Yesterday the chief was pleased with his new appointments. Today he is annoyed that his dismissals were not more generally appreciated.

PAUSE COURT. James Rippey, a lad fifteen years of age, referred to in the Gazette yesterday as having violently assaulted a woman named Margaret Nelson, being charged with the assault on the morning of the 28th inst. at the North end station, was before the court this morning on that charge. J. B. M. Baxter appeared in his behalf. The assault was clearly proved, but the magistrate imposed a light fine of \$10, which the boy's father paid.
