THIRD WITNESS FOR FROSECUTION (continued)

- Q. 86 Do you know who they were?
- A. 86 I don't remember off hand, Sir.
- Q. 87 Will you tell the Court what conversation you had with the accused, Corporal Lee, in relation to the charges against the accused?
- A. 87 I warmed Corporal Lee to be always alert and to not allow any fraternizing of prisoners of war with civilians nor allow his guards to fraternize with them. I was well satisfied when I left that Corporal Lee was carrying out his instructions the best, and I considered he was doing a very good job.

The Defending Officer declines to cross-examine the witness.

Questioned by the Court:

- Q. 88 What are the words you used when you talked to Corporal Lee?
- A. 88 First of all, when I arrived I shook hands with him, asked him how he was and how things were going. I was well satisfied with what he reported to me and he seemed to have things very well in hand and I thought he had things very well in hand.
- Q. 89 You mentioned "No Fraternizing". What words did you use when you told him bhat?
- A. 89 I told him: "You understand, no fraternizing with the prisoners, do not do anything with them other than the regular duties you have to do, and do not let the others fraternize."
- Q. 90 It was just a general warning?
- A. 90 Yes, Sir.

In the opinion of the Court and the Judge Advocate, it is not necessary to comply with R.P. 83(B).

The witness withdraws.

FOURTH WITNESS FOR PROSECUTION Mr. L. René SKHEULT, Woods Superintendent, Singer Lanufacturing Company; residing at Thurse, Quebec, being duly sworn, is examined by the Prosecutor:

- Q. 91 Will you tell the Court your name, please?
- A. 91 Louis René Schoult.
