COURT-MARTIAL ON RUSSIAN MUTINEERS

BULGARIA'S ULTIMATUM.

Constantinople, Oct. 4.—Delay on the report resulting from the inquiry into the frontier dispute of the delimitation of portions of the Vilavet of Adrianople, which led to a somewhat sharp fight recently between the soldiers guarding the post at Sujuk and the guard on duty at the Turkish post of Dervish Moglia, has brought out, practically an ultimatum from Bulgaria.

REVELATIONS BEFORE INSURANCE COMMISSION

C., had been dealing unfairly, if not dishonestly, with trust money or with each other.

LIGHTHOUSES WRECKED.
