## BANK CLERK STABBED.

His Injury Was Slight and Acci-dental, But Rumor Had it Otherwise Today.

Careful enquiries traced the affair to the Bank of Montreal, and the cor-rect version is this. Having finished their work for the day, two of the jun-ior clerks were strolling. One had a steel letter opener in his hand, and in the tussle accidentally stabbed his fellow clerk. The wound entering the leg. The flow of blood at once removed him to Dr. Murray MacLaren's office, where his wound was dressed, the doctor pro-nouncing it a slight one.

## FINED FOR FIGHTING.

Two Pugilists Who Hammered Each Other on McAvity's Wharf. Pay \$20 Each.

There was a lively fracas on Mc-Avity's wharf, next the ferry floats, when a sailor and a longshoreman punched each other in good style, much to the amusement of a large and en-couraging crowd, that had collected on the wharf as well as many passengers from the ferry. According to the police the scene of the conflict after the crowd had been dispersed looked more like a slaughter house than anything else, but the two who were in the mix-up calmly faced the magistrate this morning and said they were not guilty.

The two men concerned are George Hurder, a tall, rakish fellow of 38 years, who works along shore, and John Emery, 20 years of age, who follows the sea. The police did not see the fight, but arrested the men at several places. Hurder was arrested later on. Two witnesses testified to seeing the mix-up.

Hurder stated that Emery had called him some bad names and he asked the magistrate if he would stand such abuse. He wanted to call several wit-nesses so other matters were taken up. After waiting a reasonable time and Hurder not seeming to desire to take advantage of the chance of calling wit-nesses, the magistrate sentenced the men to a fine of \$20 each or two months with hard labor. Hurder objected strongly, and refused to go below, say-ing he was going to see the thing out. Sergt. Campbell put in an appearance at this stage and Hurder took his tip to get into jail.
