**A CHAPTER OF TRAGEDIES**

**STEEP FALLS, Me., Jan. 25.**—One man was killed instantly today by the explosion of a boiler connected with a transportable saw mill. Although two or three other employees were working in the vicinity, none of them was injured. The victim was Elmer Sanborn, aged 40, of West Baldwin, who was employed as fireman in charge of the boiler. He leaves a widow and two children. Except for the loss of the boiler the damage was slight.

**BOSTON, Jan. 25.**—Fortuna Arata, an Italian about 40 years old, is dying at the Relief Hospital as the result of a wound received in a duel with an unknown man on Portland street, near the North station, late tonight. The unknown man escaped, but the police have secured a good description of him from witnesses of the affair, and it is believed that he will be captured soon. He is said to be a companion of the wounded man. The cause of the duel is not known, but according to the witnesses both men used their revolvers. Arata, one of them, was shot in the man's side. It is thought that the unknown man was wounded.

After shooting Arata the unknown man held the crowd at bay while he made his escape. He threw away his revolver and this was later found by the police.

It was said tonight that the wounded man had previously participated in similar encounters.

**NEW YORK, Jan. 25.**—Two boys were killed accidentally, it is believed,

by illuminating gas in their home in Jersey city today, and a man occupied a room in the same house was so severely overcome that he may not recover. The dead are Thomas Melnick, aged 12, and his brother William, aged 12. John Kusel, 37, is in a critical condition.

**HOULTON, Me., Jan. 25.**—Two men were killed and one was injured in a head-on collision today between two freight trains in the Presque Isle yard of the Bangor and Arrowshead. The dead are Joseph Stewart, 37, and John McGinnis, 37, both of whom were on the train from Bangor. Engineer John Jacobs had his leg broken and sustained severe internal injuries.

The accident was caused by a regular northbound freight train backing from a siding on to the main line, on which a special southbound freight train was travelling at a high rate of speed. The two engines met head on and were completely demolished. Engineer Jacobs of the regular northbound train being caught in the wreckage before he would escape. McGinnis and Stewart were on the engine of the special freight when the collision occurred and both were killed instantly.

**PORTSTOWN, Jan. 25.**—John L. Hart, aged 13, was found hanging in the slaughter house of a relative at Stowe, Me. today. His act of self destruction is attributed to a playful remark made last night by a young girl companion who said she did not like him.

**EAST INDIANS BOYCOTT IMPORTED SUGARS**  
They imagine that Foreign Manufacturers Use All Kinds of Filth in Their Production.

**CALCUTTA, Jan. 25.**—A serious crusade has been organized against imported sugars at Armistair. The people have been led to believe that all sugars manufactured in Europe are refined by the aid of bones and that in America even more disgusting practices are resorted to by the refiners. The uncrystallized sugars of Cawnpore are recommended for use in preference to imported sugars on the ground that no objectionable matter is used in their manufacture. Printed notices, signed by many influential Hindus are being circulated condemning the use of American and European sugars. One of these notices states, "those people who at present use foreign sugars which are unwholesome and adulterated, instead of country made sugars, and thereby suffer a loss of their religion should use Cawnpore sugars." A similar notice purporting to be a copy of the opinion of the state officials of Kashmir given under the authority of the Maharaja has been issued and it is stated that no bones or liquors are used in refining sugars manufactured in Cawnpore. The value of foreign sugars imported into Armistair market is roughly estimated at \$2,000,000, and the publication of these notices is quite likely to ruin the trade in imported sugar.

**THE LAVAL RHODES SCHOLARS.**

Laval University has decided to have its students compete in the examinations for the Rhodes' scholarships. On the occasion of the first examination, the French-Canadian university declined to enter the contest at a future examination they would enter students. To date two French-Canadians and one English-speaking student of Laval have applied for an opportunity to take the required examination. They are: Messrs. Charles E. Bachand, of Sherbrooke, and Joseph H. Sauve, of L'Assomption, both law students, and Mr. Guy Moley, who, while he is of English parentage, speaks excellent French.

**A HAPPY ENDING TO LOVE'S DREAM**  
Night in Cells First for the Prospective Bride—Her Parents Had Objected.

**PETERSBOROUGH, Ont., Jan. 25.**—Edith Pritchard, a 16-year-old girl from Hamilton, and Ernest Armstrong, a young man of this city, were married in the city clerk's office this morning by Rev. E. A. Langfield. The ceremony was the witness of the bride's relatives, who live in Hamilton, objected to the marriage, and yesterday communicated with the police here, asking that she be arrested. When an officer called at her boarding house the girl made her escape by jumping out of an upstairs window, 20 feet from the ground, but escaped unhurt.

The police returned a few hours later and took her into custody, just as the marriage ceremony was about to proceed. Rev. Mr. Langfield, who was totally unaware of the objections raised by the relatives of the bride, communicated with them at Hamilton, and obtained their consent to the union. The ceremony accordingly took place today after the young lady had spent the night in the cells. All parties interested are now happy.

**A NEW DEVICE FOR WEATHER FORECASTS**

**BERLIN, Jan. 25.**—Herr C. Gruhn, of Berlin, whose apparatus for telegraphing handwriting attracted so much attention some years ago believes that he has discovered a force of nature which has been hitherto unnoticed. A wooden rod suspended by a silk thread from the top of a closed silk vessel was found under certain conditions to be influenced from the outside by another rod consisting of metal or stone. As the red outside was brought near to the vessel the suspended wooden rod was sometimes drawn towards it, and at other times repelled. Experiments showed that the conduct of the wooden rod depended on the condition of the atmosphere and the apparatus can even be used for prognosticating the weather. Each kind of weather is found to correspond with a particular behavior to thirty-six hours ahead.

As the force which influences the rod passes through substances which insulate electricity effectively an electrical theory does not explain the phenomena. Herr Gruhn and other scientists are continuing investigations.

**RUSSIAN POLICE SHOT BY TERRORISTS**

Troops Called Out to Settle the Disturbance—One Volley Was Enough.

**GRONNO, Russia, Jan. 25.**—As a result of a general strike of about 120,000 men, the authorities and a number of Terrorists on the streets today, five policemen, a prison warden and one Terrorist were killed and a number of persons wounded.

The trouble started when two men, without warning, shot and killed a prison warden. The assassins fled, one taking refuge in a church and the other in a private house. They were pursued by the police and three policemen were killed and a number of persons wounded. The man in the church, who was fired upon by the assembled crowd and killed. The Terrorist escaped. The police then proceeded to the house where the second man had hidden, and as they approached the building he opened fire and killed two of his pursuers. At this juncture troops were called out and fired a volley, killing the man who had hidden in the house and wounding several passersby.

**CAPITAL IS TWENTY FIVE MILLION DOLLARS**

**OTTAWA, Jan. 25.**—A record breaking company, so far as the capital is concerned, has been granted incorporation. The company is called "The Dominion Power and Transmission Co." It is given power to develop electricity, carry on mining, smelting, and lumbering.

The capital is twenty-five million dollars. The incorporators are an accountant, a bookkeeper, a barrister, a stenographer and six solicitors' clerks. It is understood that these dummies represent MacKenzie & Mann.
