LAWTON, Okla., Feb. 18.—Geronimo, the noted Indian chief, died today at Fort Sill, where he has been confined a prisoner of war for a number of years. Geronimo died of pneumonia at the hospital at the army post. He will be buried in the Indian cemetery near the fort tomorrow by Christian missionaries. Geronimo having become a Christian, was buried in the Indian cemetery. Geronimo was captured with his band at Skomaha, S. Dak., in 1876. He and his band were held at Fort Sill for twenty-three years.

DOCTOR IN WILD RAZE WITH DEATH

BURLINGTON, Vt., Feb. 18.—A race with death across the United States from El Paso, Texas, to Burlington, was finished here today when Dr. Nelson Jackson arrived at his dying wife's bedside after a sixty-four hour trip over more than 2,500 miles of rail. A record for the journey from Chicago to this city was established in the course of the run, the nearly 1,000 miles being covered in 11 hours. The leg from Chicago, however, was made in a special train, the charting of which cost Dr. Jackson \$1,000. The fastest time of the journey was made between Chicago and Cleveland, where he is 183 miles apart, this part of the trip occupying but two hours, 23 minutes.
