

Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations

Any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months' residence upon cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section along his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.

BLEACHING WHEAT FLOUR.

The Lancel, London, agrees fully with the action of the Bureau of Agriculture of the Department of Agriculture in this country in ruling against the bleaching of wheat flour. "The public," says the Lancel, "would be well advised to abandon the fallacious notion that the whiteness of bread is a mark of its quality. On the contrary, it nearly always means an insipid, unpalatable bread, and an attractive flavor is a factor of considerable importance in connection with the digestibility of food. The destruction of the natural color of flour by bleaching agents synchronizes with the destruction of its attractive flavor. Such tampering with the staff of life should be made illegal."

OTTAWA, May 16.—The Commons by dint of sticking strictly to the business of legislation on Saturday and eliminating politics, accomplished a record day's work for the session and wiped off nearly a dozen important items on the order papers. The desire of the members to rush through the balance of the session agreed on so as to reach prorogation on Wednesday next, was evidenced in the rapidity with which the 102 clauses insurance bill were passed through the common stages in a little over two hours, with the exception of the clause providing for a tax of 15 per cent upon the next cost of fire insurance effected in foreign companies, which caused some further consideration on Monday.

All Wiped Off

The government bill authorizing the government to raise by way of loan \$50,000,000 to redeem maturing loans, the bill to create a separate portfolio of labor and the bill amending the criminal code in several important particulars, were all wiped off the order paper before the house rose at 11.30 P. M.

Practically the only objection raised to the insurance bill in respect to the clause taking the five insurance of 15 per cent of the premiums paid. The right to insure in such companies was made a part of a bill at the suggestion of the manufacturers who insure with New England mutual companies, claiming that such affected at a cheaper rate than it possible in Canada, where a combine of underwriters was alleged to exist. Mr. Perry, Mr. Thorburn and others objected to the tax as being an interference with individual liberty. After some discussion this clause was left over until Monday and the rest of the bill was reported.

Rendered Necessary

In moving a second reading of the bill to create a portfolio of labor Sir Wilfrid Laurier explained that the House had been rendered necessary by

BEST WORK OF SESSION.

With a small attendance of members

the commons did the best work of the session during the evening sitting, clearing off the order paper a half-dozen government bills. A third reading was given the bill providing that the interest of the money advanced to the Montreal harbor commissioners for elevators and other terminal facilities shall be charged to the commission's capital account. The bill to amend the exchequer court act, to amend the Intercolonial and Prince Edward Railway employees' provident act is a minor particular, and to amend the criminal code were also given a third reading. On the last named bill an amendment was proposed by Hon. R. P. Sutherland, making it a criminal offense for electric companies to neglect to protect the public from danger from their transmission lines. After a brief discussion the amendment was withdrawn pending further consideration next session.


The punishment for kidnapping was increased by the bill from seven to twenty-five years. Mr. Borden brought up the question of amending the code with reference to "race track betting." He read a telegram from the Methodist Conference of British Columbia asking for more stringent legislation in view of the fact that American bookmakers, barred out of the States by recent legislation, passed there, were now frequenting Canadian tracks.

The Minister of Justice suggested that before any government action was taken he would like to obtain the opinion of the members of the House.

Mr. Borden while believing that some action was necessary, thought it would be well to have the "whole question considered by a special committee of the Commons. No other members expressed an opinion.

The government annuities act of last session was amended by the passing of a bill providing for the issuing of separate annuities to husband and wife. The private bill emanating from the senate relating to the water carriage of goods was on motion of H. H. Miller read a second time, and gave on government orders.
