Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations

west Land Regulations

Any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties.—Six months' residence upor, and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing rate pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. If attes.—Must reside six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.



are practically absent, save a few low forms of hardy lichens and mosses. No plant life gladdens the eye, and even the hum of insects is unheard, the terrestrial fauna consisting of wingless insects. Sea life is more abundant than in any other ocean, the higher forms being whales, seals and birds—skuas, penguins and petres—but owing to distance and danger, their pursuit and capture are not considered remunerative.

The thermometer indicates that the south pole is the coldest region known. The normal temperature in summer is several degrees below freezing point, and the snowfall at all seasons of the acar is considerable.

On the other hand, although the ice

On the other hand, although the ice is covered with snow at varying depths, it is fairly easy to traverse, and presents no such troublesome obstacles as predominate in the north pole regions. Then, too, the season for travelling in the antarctic region is much longer, because there is no danger whatever from a sudden breaking up of the ice fields.

A French writer says that the monotony of the south polar landscape is far greater than that of the north pole. "The ice," he says, "shows a color just as vivid, but there the rainbows are fixed and the icebergs affect the same form—large cubes, all alike. Such monotonous surroundings make them tedium, the inactivity of the long polar night most depressing."
