REFORMER SPENDS AN AFTERNOON IN JAIL

PHILADELPHIA, Pa., March 9.—

Logan M. Bullitt, son of the father of Philadelphia's charter, the Bullitt bill, and himself a prominent worker in civil reform movements, was arrested today by the order of Mayor Reahman and locked in a cell in the City Hall when he endeavored to serve the mayor with a subpoena in an equity suit, brought by a committee of citizens against the city official.

Bullitt is the head of a committee which has been making an exhaustive investigation of the city's financial affairs and has threatened to tie up all further expenditures by two bills in equity filed some time ago in the local courts. Hearings on these bills were set for next Saturday, and by order of the court, subpoenas were issued for the heads of the various city departments to bring in the records in their charge.

Later in the evening Bullitt was released on an order signed by Magistrate Gorman.

ATLANTIC FEARS NOT NAUGHTY CARD PROBE.

Let Comstock, of New York City, Come

Atlantic City, N. J., March 9.—

Police officials of this resort, informed tonight of the coming visit of Anthony Comstock, promised during his address before ministers in Philadelphia today, declared their belief that the head of the Society for Suppression of Vice would find little to condemn in the stock of postal cards and other boardwalk pictures which he claims are in need of reform.

Although Comstock told the Presbyterian ministers whom he addressed in the Witherspoon Building today that he had received an appeal to enter into a crusade against naughty postals sold in boardwalk shops, local officials claim that the objectionable cards have all been driven from sale by recent active police crusades backed by women residents, and that Comstock will find little or nothing to engage his attention.

Local reform association officials say they know nothing of the visit of the New York reformer, and that they have already carried out the work of clearing the boardwalk of obscene pictures. Half a score of offenders charged with sale of obscene postals have been arrested and punished in the past two years.

DRIVING STUDENTS TO ROB GRAVEYARDS

Sociational Statements Made by Dean of Medical Faculty—Traffic in Bodies.

TORONTO, March 9.—Some very serious statements were made by Dr. J. C. Connell, dean of the medical faculty of Queen's University, Kingston, in upholding the incorporation of the Hamilton School of Anatomy before the private bills committee today. Dr. Connell stated that Hamilton in advocating the measure pointed out that incorporation would give necessary authority for dissection and anatomical work on human bodies. The proposal aroused a vigorous opposition from Kingston. There was some plain speaking by the medical dean.

"The truth might as well be frankly spoken if the scarcity of bodies continues," said Dr. Connell, "it will drive students to rob graveyards. At the present time," he continued, "inspectors are trafficking in bodies, collecting all the way from \$25 to \$75 per body."

Dr. Connell referred to the small number of bodies which had been turned over to Kingston during the past two years, only ten per cent. or less of what they had to use.

"You ask how we got them," he added. "It is unnecessary to ask, and those who administer law should be the last to ask. We are loath to do anything of the kind. We therefore urge the authorities to give us a fair trial."

TOKIO, March 10.—The further conversion of \$50,000,000 of the domestic loan has been agreed upon between Count Katsura, the Premier and a syndicate of bankers. It is stated that the successful flotation of the first conversion of \$50,000,000 was extremely encouraging and that the next issue will be on the same terms. These provide for a four per cent. basis, the issue price being 95.

SEWAGE CLEANSER HULLS OF VESSELS

Ordinarily Useless Refuse Found to Kill Marine Vegetables and Animal Growth.

ALAMEDA, Cal., March 9.—Sewage emptying into the ship basin of the Alaska Packers' Association in the estuary off the north end of Sherman street has saved thousands of dollars annually to the big salmon-canning corporation, according to a representative of the concern. The sewage matter, mixed with the fresh water that conveys it through the conduits into the ship basin, is said to destroy the destructive teredo and other animal and marine growths that attach themselves to the hulls of the vessels. Ships that have been towed into the basin incured with a heavy animal and vegetable growth have, after lying for a time in the sewage-impregnated water, become almost as clean as if the vessels had been scraped on a drydock or marine railway.

The value of sewage in ridding ships of marine animal and vegetable parasites has been known to shipping men on the estuary for some time, but it was not until recently, when there was a general discussion as to where the proposed south side sewer should empty, that the value of sewage in cleaning ships was learned by city officials.

While City Engineer L. N. Chapman was seeking a route for the proposed sewer he engaged a representative of the Alaska packers in conversation concerning the matter. Chapman was surprised when the packers said that the association would be pleased to have all of the sewage drained from the estuary into the ship basin.

The packer said that the sewage which has for years emptied into the estuary had proved an economical cleanser of the bottom of ships, and asserted that enough sewage could be emptied into the ship basin to please the packing association.

In proof of the fact that the teredo does not like sewage-infected water, City Engineer Chapman cites the fact that the old wooden sewage laid out into the estuary on the north side years ago are still intact and free of teredos.

KILLED CO-OPERATIVE

SOCIETIES' BILL

OTTAWA, March 9.—The banking and commerce committee of the Commons by a vote of 10 to 8 yesterday killed Mr. Lloyd Harris' bill respecting co-operative societies. The bill goes further than Mr. Monk's bill which was reported on Monday by the committee and which deals only with co-operative credit societies. Mr. Harris' bill seeks to give legislative authority for co-operative societies generally.

The bill was vigorously opposed by Messrs. Nesbitt and Gervais who declared that there was no popular demand at present for any such far-reaching and radical legislation. Messrs. Monk, Harris and Smith of Middlesex supported the bill and after an hour's discussion the committee killed it on the above vote.

PARIS, March 10.—The Societe Nationale Des Beaux Arts and the Societe Des Artistes Francais have decided not to participate in the universal exposition to be held in Rome in 1911, because of the adoption by the managers of a regulation prejudicial to the impressionistic school.

MR. COPP CRITICIZES PROVINCIAL FINANCES

Money Wasted on Roads and Bridges for P.lical Purposes, Declares Member for Westmorland.

FREDERICTON, March 10.—The budget debate was continued in the House yesterday. A strong criticism of the Government's finances was made by Mr. Copp in the course of a vigorous address.

The debate was resumed by Mr. Jones. The speaker went into particulars on a number of items in the report. He congratulated the Government on their excellent school book policy. Mr. Jones defended the Government's agricultural policy, and gave praise to the chief commissioners of public works. The member from Kings also dwelt at length on the St. John Valley Road project.

Mr. Copp said that it was true there was an increased revenue, but the present government had not given credit to the old administration for adding \$130,000 annually to the revenue in Dominion subsidies.

The leader of the Government, when in opposition, had stated that \$90,000 was too great an expenditure, yet the glory administration had increased it to \$125,000. The speaker also showed that in other matters the present Government was acting directly opposite to the policy when in opposition.

Resuming after recess, Mr. Copp continued his criticism of the provincial finances, taking up expenditures on account of the money wasted on roads and bridges for political purposes. He was informed that a gentleman who handled the patronage in Albert county had told the electors in Coverdale at the time of the last federal election that if they did not vote for the Conservative candidate they would never have another dollar spent on their roads thereafter.

In Albert county one man was given carte blanc to go out and build bridges and his bill for a few months' services was \$1,000. Mr. Copp was followed by Mr. Dickson of Albert.

DIVORCE PROBLEM STILL COMPLEX.

Extensive Practitioner Suggests That District Registrars be Empowered to Grant Divorces.

LONDON, March 9.—At today's sessions of the Royal Commission which is investigating the whole subject of divorce with a view to suggesting reforms, W. I. Barnard, K. C., an extensive practitioner before the Divorce Court, opposed the suggestion that jurisdiction over divorce cases be extended to the County Courts, on the ground that it would lead to an increase in the number of such suits. Actions, he said, would be brought without any certainty of obtaining decrees. If the object, however, was to extend the grounds for divorce in order to make it cheap and easy, he thought there could be no objection to transferring jurisdiction over such cases to any court. In fact it would not be necessary to have a court at all. There might, in the opinion of the witness, be a registrar in each district who could grant divorces to applicants. There would then be no need of anything similar to what obtained in some of the states of the union.
