

JAPAN WILL NOT MAKE SEPARATE PEACE

JAPAN BINDS HERSELF TO STAY WITH ALLIES UNTIL VICTORY HAS BEEN ASSURED

Tokio Government Gives Full and Complete Adherence to Terms of Declaration of England, France and Russia That None of the Allies Make Separate Peace.

London, Oct. 29.—Japan has become a party to the agreement not to conclude a separate peace. Announcement was made today that a note was addressed to the Japanese government on October 19, inviting it to give adherence to the declaration of Great Britain, France and Russia, signed on September 5 of last year, that none of these nations would conclude a separate peace. On the same day that this request was made Count Inouye, Japanese ambassador to Great Britain replied that he had been authorized by his government to give "their full and complete adherence to the terms of this declaration."

Calcutta, via London, Oct. 29.—The India government announces the termination of the occupation of Bushire, Persia, the Persian government having taken steps to ensure order and the security of British interests.

Thousands of Syrian Refugees at Salmas

London, Oct. 29.—The Foreign Office has received a despatch from British Consul Shipley at Tabriz, Persia, which says that 25,000 Syrian mountaineers from the Tyari and adjacent districts have taken refuge in Salmas, and that 10,000 more are expected there. All are destitute and unless help is received many of them will inevitably perish, as winter is close at hand.

Consul Shipley adds that the American relief committee, under the presidency of the United States consul, is endeavoring to do all that is possible, but that its funds are entirely inadequate to meet the requirements of the situation, which justifies an urgent appeal to the charity of Great Britain. Mr. Shipley suggests that all funds be sent to him for distribution through the American committee, which he believes is the best agency for giving effective relief.

FREDERICTON POLICE BOMB PLOTTER RAID HOTEL RECEIVED FUNDS FROM GERMANY

Eight barrels of Booze seized — Capital gives 36th Overseas Battery a splendid welcome.

Special to The Standard, Fredericton, Oct. 29.—The police made a successful Scott Act raid this afternoon at Long's Hotel, when eight barrels and two jugs of a variety of malt and spirituous liquors, valued at upwards of \$100 were seized. Practically the entire police force participated in the raid which was the third Scott Act seizure in as many days in this city.

Fredericton gave the 36th overseas battery a most enthusiastic reception this afternoon when the first of the units to be stationed here for the winter arrived to go into mobilization quarters. Major Crowe and his 160 Cape Bretoners were met upon arrival from Sydney on their I. C. R. special train by an official civic delegation with the Fredericton Brass Band and thousands of citizens and accompanied to the military barracks, where Mayor Mitchell delivered an official address of welcome, expressing the pleasure of the citizens to have the 36th battery come here. Major Crowe replied briefly, expressing the hope that his command would live up to the many good things said of them.

The 36th battery came by special train of seven cars via I. C. R. and National Transcontinental Railway, and despite having been over 24 hours on the cars, took a front rank among the several fine units which have been located in Fredericton since the outbreak of the war. They marched well, carried themselves well and showed unusual results from the six weeks training they have had at Sydney.

ABUSIVE METHOD IN RECRUITING UNWISE, SIR SAM HUGHES SAYS

Ottawa, Oct. 29.—Sir Sam Hughes said today that much harm was being done by speakers at recruiting meetings making unwise attacks on men for not recruiting.

"At a meeting I addressed recently in Massey Hall, Toronto," said the minister, "there were not more than 200 men of fighting age present."

U. S. OFFICERS FAIL TO TRACE CONNECTION TO ANY OFFICIAL IN EUROPE.

New York, Oct. 29.—Federal officials made it known today that the government was in possession of information that Robert Fay, under arrest in connection with the bomb conspiracy, received financial aid from Germany, but it was stated that no connection had been traced to any official in Europe. Fay had already confessed that he had been supplied with funds before coming to America. United States Attorney Marshall reiterated his previous statement that the government contemplated no further arrests at present, although he was convinced that the five men already arrested were not all those implicated.

JOHN RYDER, PROMINENT ST. STEPHEN MAN, DIED YESTERDAY

B., Oct. 29.—After an illness of a few months' duration, John Ryder, one of our best known and most esteemed citizens, passed away this morning at the age of eighty-three years and eleven months. He was the son of an English soldier and was born at St. Andrews, this county, but had lived nearly all of his long and useful life in St. Stephen. He was prominent in military affairs in his younger days and was a member of the first brass band organized in the town. He was at the head of the local fire department until quite recent years and took a prominent part in clean sports.

Mr. Ryder carried on the harness business for many years, that establishment being in his name, and was everywhere respected for his business integrity. He was a vestryman in Trinity church for many years and a prominent member of Frontier Lodge, Knights of Pythias, under whose auspices he will be buried from Trinity church Sunday afternoon. Mr. Ryder was twice married and is survived by his widow. Of the first family
