#### Watch Roads For Liquor Vendors

Chief Liquor Inspector J. B. Hawthorne, has arrived here from Fredericton to be present for the trial of the action in Chancery today in connection with the injunction against himself and the attorney-general, preventing them from seizing liquor brought here from Montreal for export purposes. The attorney-general, Mr. J. P. Byrne, K. C., is expected. Mr. Hawthorne said that a new sub-inspector, C. McLean, had been taken to the force of liquor inspectors about two weeks ago, and was at present working in this city although his position was only a temporary one. The chief inspector said that McLean had been engaged to watch the roads along which traffic in liquor travels from here to the United States.

#### Successful Year of Work For Missions

Methodist Women's Missionary Society Held Interesting Sessions Yesterday.

Three very interesting sessions of the Women's Missionary Society of the Methodist Church were held yesterday at Barnhart Street Church. The occasion was the 38th annual meeting and the attendance, which was large at all sessions, told of the enthusiasm of members for the cause of Missions.

#### Morning Session

At the morning session Mrs. W. A. Thompson gave an address and missionaries were introduced. Mrs. C. F. Sanford, the president, was in the chair.

Committees were appointed as follows: Courtesy, Mrs. Sample, Mrs. Donville and Miss Rose Hopkins; reports, Mrs. C. F. Sanford, Mrs. H. Barker; for the Palm Branch, Miss Weddall; for the Wesleyan, Miss Nellie Copp; for the city papers, Mrs. Ruth Wyse and Miss Eleanor Johnson.

The president called to the platform one returned missionary and two missionaries-elect and welcomed them to the meeting. Miss Mary Veasey had served four terms in Japan and was for one year in Western Canada. Miss Florence Bird, another missionary in Japan, was not present yesterday but is expected to arrive soon.

The two missionaries-elect are Miss Louise Callbeck who is going to Japan and Miss Mary Fitzpatrick who has been assigned to the Regina field. Mrs. W. A. Thompson, vice-president, gave an address, taking as her subject "Seeing Byes and Hearing Ears." She appealed to the delegates to make the best use of their eyes while at the meetings. A great honor and privilege was theirs, also a great responsibility. She urged them to stop, look and listen so that they might be able to take back to the districts from which they had come something of the great message they learned here. She told of the importance of prompt and regular attendance at the meetings and urged the use of a note book that nothing be lost.

Mrs. G. F. Dawson was called upon to explain the question box which was a means for obtaining information. The president announced that she had received an invitation from the ladies of the Red Cross Society for the delegates to visit the Red Cross depot in Prince William Street.

Mrs. E. A. Westmorland gave a short talk on the literature table and the wealth of material to be found there, urging the delegates to make free use of it. She briefly sketched the variety of leaflets and pamphlets placed there and suggested the means for receiving benefit from a thorough perusal of them.

#### Afternoon Session.

At the afternoon session a conference of the auxiliaries was held. Mrs. T. A. Clarke, treasurer, explained the importance of reporting and remitting regularly to the branch treasurer.

Mrs. P. S. Enman, secretary, spoke on enlargement of membership, urging greater efforts in this direction. A paper entitled "Our Sisters in Need" was read by Mrs. J. B. Champion, telling of the urgency of the call to foreign service.

Miss Myra Veasey, returned missionary from Japan, was heard in an interesting talk on "Converts that are worth while." She told of the W. M. S. in Japan, and the work of the three missionary girls' boarding schools in Japan. Excellent work is being accomplished by three girls' boarding schools in Japan supported by Methodist missions.

#### Treasurer's Report

The treasurer, Mrs. Clarke, reported: Total receipts, \$15,502.02; auxiliary expenses, \$249.29; total sent to branch treasurer, \$15,252.73. Receipts included annual fees, \$2,730; life members, \$1,825; associate help, \$48.32; L. B. Credit Roll, \$6,354; public meetings, \$745.60; mite boxes, \$3,068.75; donations, \$1,244.61; rest fund, \$417.83; Easter offering, \$3,444.81. Total increase over the previous year was \$1,000. Funds showed increase, while auxiliary expenses had decreased.

#### Auxiliaries

Mrs. Enman reported number of auxiliaries, 108; annual members, 2,735; life members, 415; associate members, 136; Little Light Bearers, 193. Total new members, 398; new life members, 73.

#### Reports and Papers

A report on Palm Branch was read by Mrs. Enman, stating that there are 8,513 subscribers in Canada, an increase of 500.

Mrs. Drummond read Mrs. W. Munroe's practical paper on the use of the Palm Branch, showing how its usefulness may be largely increased. A talk on the Outlook and its helpfulness was read by Mrs. W. Penna. There are at present 1,080 subscribers. Various testimonies to the two magazines were given by delegates. Discussing in the magazines followed, at the conclusion of which, on motion of Mrs. Gough, a message of thanks will be sent to those who draw up the helpful programmes. Mrs. J. D. Chipman will convey this message.

#### Journey Through Orient

In imagination, Miss Myra Veasey took her hearers on a delightful journey from Orient to Orient, from Yokohama to Vancouver. With vivid descriptions this pleasing speaker made the Japanese mode of life clearly appear before her hearers. She told of the strange customs met by Japanese brides coming to Canada, where all is so different. Fifteen hundred Japanese fishermen live near Vancouver, the largest Japanese colony in the world. These men frequently send home for their families. A young Japanese Christian woman is placed on the steamer and is able to pick up the two lives and assist in many ways. There are not so many "picture brides" as formerly—that is, brides married to men they have never seen. This is done by the mission aries in Vancouver in teaching household science to these newcomers. Four thousand Japanese live in Vancouver and some of the women are terribly isolated. A W. M. S. has been established and the Japanese are grateful for what has been done for them. It is our duty to give them our best. They will make good citizens and they will help us to Christianize Japan when they re-visit Japan. More workers are needed. Let us heed the call.

Yesterday arrangements were completed whereby Allan Gundry takes possession of the premises formerly devoted to men's furnishings and will transform this portion into one of the most up to date jewelry stores in Canada. Mr. Gundry has leased the half of the building near his own establishment with a frontage of twenty-two feet and a depth of eighty feet. A permanent partition will divide his store from the Macaulay establishment but a wide arch doorway will give passage between the two stores. The design for this work has been chosen and construction will be completed by July 31st at which time Mr. Gundry will give up his present premises in the Victoria Building and move to his new store.
