Further Particulars of Averill's Victory.

THE SITUATION AT ATLANTA.

THE LOSSES AT THE BATTLE OF THE 22ND JULY.

New York, August 10.—The N. Y. Tribune's special, at Harper's Ferry, gives the particulars of Averill's victory:—

We have buried and delivered to the enemy under a flag of truce, sent in by them in front of the 3rd division of the 17th army corps, 1,000 of their killed.

The number of their dead in front of the 4th division of the same corps, including those on the ground not now occupied by our troops, Gen. Blair reports, will swell the number of their dead in front to 2,000.

The number of dead buried in front of the 15th corps up to this hour is 360, and the commanding officer reports that at least as many more are yet unburied, burying parties being still at work.

The number of dead buried in front of the 16th corps was 422.

We have over 1,000 of their wounded in our hands, the large number of wounded being carried off during the night after the engagement by them.

General Blair's division stands of colour, and have also captured 5,000 stands of arms.

The attack was made on our lines seven times and was seven times repulsed.

Hood's and Hardee's corps and Wheeler's cavalry attacked us.

We have sent to the rear 1,000 prisoners, including thirty-three commissioned officers of high rank.

We still occupy the field and the troops are in fine spirits.

A detailed and full report will be forwarded as soon as completed.

Our total loss, 3,521. Hood's army thus far reported, buried or delivered to them, 3,220; total prisoners sent north, 1,017; total prisoners wounded in our hands, 1,000; estimated loss of the enemy, at least 10,000.

MORE OF THE INDIAN OUTRAGES IN THE WEST.

The propeller *Rescue* from the Chicago, en route for Buffalo, burst her boiler last night, off Rondeau Point, Lake Erie.

Twelve of the crew were lost. The cabin and upper works of the vessel are burned.

The cargo, consisting of flour, pork and high wines, was also destroyed.

The steamer *Asen*, of Kingston, picked up the survivors of the crew, and towed the hull to the beach, near Deshaun.

The names of the crew that perished are not ascertained.

OWASO, Aug. 10.—The Indians are hourly committing new depredations, stealing stock, burning trains, and killing indiscriminately. They were within 100 yards of the pickets of Fort Kearney last night, and fired an arrow at one of them.

A coach arrived at Fort Kearney this morning and reports having passed several trains which had been burned, and dead bodies lying by their side.

A party of six whites were killed at 32 Mile Creek last night.

The Indians have stolen all the stock at Cottonwood Station, 2 miles west of Fort Kearney. This morning a party of soldiers started in pursuit of them. It is well known that renegades, supposed to be from Quantrel's band, are associated with the Indians in these depredations.

PORT KARAMIE, Aug. 9.—The Indians are getting very bold. There is great alarm throughout the country. It is feared they will attack this point.

Many emigrants have been killed and much stock taken.

NEW YORK, Aug. 10.—The Post containing a detailed account, showing how the rebels have been engaged in capturing the title page, and capturing a picket reserve of 125 men. A tremendous artillery fire accompanied the skirmish and developed some very heavy rebel guns.

The rebels cannot continue long in Atlanta. If they continue butting against our works, they will soon wear themselves out without doing us much hurt, and at the same time, run the risk of losing their communications, upon which we are constantly operating.

The Macon line is the only one left to them. It is said we have destroyed that; if so, we have got them where they cannot succeed in bursting through our lines elsewhere. Yet we are so powerfully entrenched that a single line is able to hold our works against any assault of theirs.

The cleanliness and comfort of the inmates of our hospitals reflect great credit on the medical gentleness in attendance.

The Herald's Potomac correspondent, of the 7th instant, says:—The efficiency of the whole command is constantly increased by the return of convalescents wounded in this campaign.

Heavy artillery firing took place today. A portion of a shell struck Major Chapman, 29th Mass., inflicting a mortal wound.

The Atlanta correspondent of the N. Y. Times, under date of Aug. 1st, says the situation of that city is as follows:—The 14th corps, which is well up in its advance, is located on both sides of the railway to Chattanooga. The 5-mile post being in its midst, therefore it is three miles to the centre of the city.

The city is said to be three miles through in any direction.

This would bring our encampment to within two miles of the outskirts of the city.

Our line of battle, or at least our skirmish line, is a full mile in advance of our trains. Thus we are at least one mile from the city and two miles to the centre thereof.

There are many eminences hereabout from which the city may be seen plainly with the naked eye, or with a glass from a high hill.

To the right of the 20th corps headquarters, one may distinctly view the operations of groups of men and women on the roofs and elevations beyond the city.

We are somewhat puzzled at the stubborn front presented by the enemy.

Gen. Hood has been dreadfully worried since our encroachments commenced, and has experienced three disastrous defeats, in which, according to the rebel newspapers, he has sustained a loss of 20,000 men. Yet he keeps up a bold front and stands his ground to the great dissatisfaction of our skirmish line, which made three unsuccessful attempts to advance yesterday.

We cannot, with the least chance of success, attempt to carry the enemy's fortifications by assault.

There are two ways to effect his dislodgment. If our right wings round on the Macon road, he must be believed to come out of his works and fight us in open field, or make his escape to the north and east as best he can. If, however, in that case, the enemy persists in declining to fight or evacuate, then Gen. Sherman must provide his army with twenty days' rations to go down the river, as he did at Buzzard Roost and Alcona.

Washington, Aug. 10.—Major-General Sherman, in transmitting the official report of Gen. Logan to Gen. Halleck, said that although the number of dead rebels seemed excessive, he is disposed to give full credit to the report that our loss was only 3,521—killed, wounded and missing. The enemy's dead alone on the field nearly equalled the number, viz. 3,220.

HEADQUARTERS REPORT.—Army of the Tennessee, before Atlanta, Georgia, July 24. (General)—I have the honor to report the following general summary of the result of the attack of the enemy on this army on the 22d inst.—total loss in killed, wounded,
