WILL BUILD QUARTZ MILL

To be Established in a Short Time

The Lepine Group to be Worked This Summer—Tests Have Proven it Will Pay.

Within the next three months there will be a quartz mill established and in active operation on the Lepine group, which is located but a short distance from Dawson.

Prospecting work on this group has been carried on for the last three or four years and many shafts and cross cuts have been made which prove to the absolute satisfaction of the owners that a great body of gold-bearing quartz has been discovered.

The method by which the test was made is the same as will be employed in milling the quartz. The cyanide process, which will be used, is perhaps the least expensive method employed in milling quartz and obtains excellent results in extracting the gold from the rock.

The mill which will be erected before the snow goes off the ground will have a capacity of 50 tons per day. A saw mill plant and large furnace will also be erected by the company in close proximity to the mill.
