

SUMMER RESORTS.

The Fisheries Along the North Shore.

Tourists Who Visit Them Annually.

In Saturday's *GLAZIER* reference was made to the extent of the salmon fishing on the Restigouche river and the number of tourists that annually find their way there from distant cities, the information having been obtained from Mr. J. Henry Phair, the fishery commissioner. This river and many others in our Province are fast becoming popular resorts for tourists, the number of which are rapidly increasing every year. The local government since it has obtained the sole control of these inland fisheries on the ungranted lands have made every provision for the protection and for the encouragement of all who are desirous of taking advantage of the fine fishing privileges which our rivers afford. The Restigouche fisheries is the greatest source of revenue for the government, there being a large extent of ungranted territory, the greater portion of which is now leased. But there are on many other rivers in the province a large amount of ungranted fishing grounds where exists the most

Excellent Trout and Salmon Fishing, which are still unleased. Mr. Phair is using every endeavor to have these ungranted fishing rights leased, especially on rivers that are as yet comparatively unknown to fishermen and tourists. He has been successful this year in leasing a fishing right on the N. W. Miramichi, to Mr. Almon, of St. John, who has purchased a lease from the mouth of the Sagoué down to the Miramichi. Mr. Almon intends fishing here this year with a number of friends. He will also have a guest list appointed for the protection of his fishing right. Leases have also been taken out this year on the branches of the Upsatch and the lower part of the Restigouche.

The Neigopit river has long been celebrated as the

Best Salmon River in America, but the greater portion of it is granted. Messrs. Spurr, Jones and Kinney, of St. John, are large riparian proprietors of the best fishing grounds on the river. Mr. Wm. Adams, of Boston, owns the greater portion of what is known as the "Rough Water." He is also a lessee of the provincial government. Mr. Leckie, of Springfield, Nova Scotia, is also a lessee of the government and occupies the grounds next above Mr. Adams.

The Bathurst salmon club, which is composed of a number of young men of Bathurst, are also large riparian proprietors and have considerable fishing rights on the river. The club lets stretches of their fishing rights to tourists, for which they receive handsome prices. Last year a number of Canadians, including Mr. McDonald and Judge Brooks, fished Mr. Leckie's grounds; and a large number of New York and other American gentlemen spent the greater portion of the fishing season on Mr. Adams' territory. Messrs. Spurr and Kinney also let their grounds, so that altogether there is now a large number of tourists.

Fishing Annually on this river, giving employment to a great many settlers who employ as canoe men and boatmen, and the most of the summer season are chased at Bathurst. Lessees on this river, as on all the other rivers, are compelled to employ at least one guardian for the protection of the waters during the open season.

On Jacques river Messrs. Cox and Sargent, of Newcastle, have the lease of all the ungranted fishing rights on the river. A good many Americans fish on this river, obtaining the right from these gentlemen. About a mile below the mouth of the Jacques river, along the bay coast, there is a fishing point, very pleasantly located, which Mr. Phair claims to be the best fishing place in the province. This place is getting to be a

Famous Summer Resort, and last year the proprietor, during the whole of the month of July and August, had upwards of seven hundred guests and had to turn a number away, being unable to accommodate them. He has built a large number of huts for the accommodation of his guests. Mr. Phair states that there are several other rivers in the vicinity of Bathurst on which there are excellent salmon and trout fishing, but most of the fishing rights are held by the province and big and little Tracadie are celebrated for their trout fishing and are visited by a good many tourists. There is considerable ungranted land on these rivers, but no leases have been taken out yet.

All the ungranted fishing rights on these rivers are visited annually by the fishery commissioner, Mr. Phair, whose duty it is to appoint guardians and to look after the protection of the rivers. He generally spends about two months during the fishing season on these rivers. He intends this summer after his return from the north to take an extended tour on the waters, which have hitherto been mostly unexplored for, on the Miramichi and its branches.

Besides the rivers above mentioned there is now good salmon fishing on the Tobique river both on the granted and ungranted lands. A good many of the American tourists go up the Tobique river and portage to the Neigopit and the Upsatch lakes. On the Green, Grand and Madawaska rivers and the numerous lakes in their vicinity there is, as is well known, good trout fishing and large number of tourists find their way to these rivers every summer.

In the southern part of the province are also some good fishing waters. Three years ago there was no salmon caught in the St. Croix river, but the headwaters of this river and the lakes in the vicinity have now become a favorite fishing ground, the salmon fry having been placed in the waters by the State of Maine. The New Brunswick railway company are appreciating the advantages to be derived from such a large influx of tourists in the province and are having the lakes and waters along their line carefully looked after. In many of the lakes, such as the Magaguadavic and Oronoto lakes, the company have had what is known as landlocked salmon placed in them. On Skiff lake and North lake are excellent trout fishing, and a fish breeding establishment is now talked of for the former lake, which lake is at present under lease by an English gentleman.

NEW BRUNSWICK S. S. ASSOCIATION.

Sunday School Work, Provincial Convention, A Proposal Made.

At a meeting of the executive committee of the New Brunswick Sunday School Association, held in St. John recently, the programme of the provincial convention to be held at Fredericton on Sept. 14th, 15th, and 16th, was drawn up. Its principal features are an opening religious service with a sermon on the evening of Tuesday, the 14th, and the discussion at subsequent sessions of the following subjects: A Sunday School Time Table, A Model Primary Class Session, The Qualifications and Duties of a S. S. Superintendent, The Teacher's Self-Improvement for his work, How can we best teach Temperance in the Sunday School. The president of the association, W. G. Gance, was appointed to secure speakers to open the discussion of each subject.

A proposal was made that counties be asked to hold their annual conventions during the months of July and August each year, for the following reasons: (1) statistics are collected in June, so would be available for use at the county conventions, and their reports to the provincial convention in September would likely be more complete and satisfactory. (2) It would awaken an interest in the work and induce a large number to attend the provincial convention. (3) The summer months are the best time for holding conventions. (4) It would be more convenient for members of the executive committee, as the conventions held in close succession. The secretary was instructed to correspond with county associations in regard to the matter.

The blanks for annual reports are to be issued immediately, and it is hoped that every superintendent who receives one will fill it up promptly and return it as directed. If any superintendent has not received one by the second week in June he will confer a favor by notifying by postal card Geo. A. Henderson, 178 Duke street, St. John.

Five and six counties in the province remain unorganized, and three of these have already appointed dates for holding their first convention.

The honor examinations will be held on Friday and Saturday, 4th and 5th of June.

The Normal School.

The work of the present term of the normal school closes to-day. The public closing exercises will be held to-morrow morning commencing at 9 o'clock. The examinations for licenses begin on Tuesday next. Upwards of 800 student-teachers will present themselves for examination. The public are invited to attend the closing exercises to-morrow.

PROVINCIAL NEWS.

Various Items of Interest from Different Quarters.

Chatham Postmastership—A Young Lady Rescued from Instant Death.

Dalhousie can now boast of a tonsorial artist, formerly of Providence, R. I. The Salvation Army at its meeting at St. John on Tuesday evening secured the sum of \$250 through donations, towards paying for the Landowine rink.

A notice is posted in the St. Croix Cotton Mill which reads: "On or after the 29th inst. one-third of the help in the different apartments will be discharged."

Some young men in St. John are making an effort to procure suitable grounds for their sports—base ball, quoits, and the like. They expect that the cost of the ground and the putting of it in proper trim will cost about \$1,000.

The Jack-Arran hotel will be open for tourists about the middle of June. No doubt the managers will have a full house here in consequence of the extensive free advertising it has had. The scenery is something grand and the facilities for sea bathing and fishing are unsurpassed.

Salmon have struck into the Miramichi rather earlier than usual. The first catch was on Monday, the 17th, when five were caught in the vicinity of Bay du Vin. Some few were caught during the week. The first catch in the vicinity of Newcastle was by Mr. Alex. Henderson, of Canadian Marsh, his prize being a twenty pounder.

The funeral of Mrs. McMillan, wife of Hon. John McMillan, post office inspector, took place at St. John, on Tuesday afternoon, and was attended by a large number of friends and relatives of the deceased. The ceremonies at the deceased's residence were conducted by Rev. Dr. Macrae. The pallbearers were Hon. Judge Steadman, Hon. John Boyd, Thomas McMillan, James Reid, John McMillan and Robert Thompson, Jr. Conductor R. W. Vye received a lady from Chatham, named Miss McCarty, from instant death, yesterday. She attempted to cross in front of the Northern accommodation at Wolford, where the train passed. This was in motion and unfortunately the young lady's foot turned under, and but for the presence of mind of Conductor Vye she would have been carried to her grave. The doctor was not more than three feet from her when he hailed her from her perilous position.

There are quite a number of new buildings in course of erection at Dalhousie, the completion of the R. C. Church being rapidly pushed forward by Mr. P. B. Troy, the contractor. Mr. Alex. Chisholm is putting up a new house directly opposite the old one. When finished it will add greatly to the appearance of the town. The new stone house and the new house of the R. C. Church will be completed about the middle of July; it will be somewhat larger than the last one that was destroyed by fire.

The World of Saturday reports that Mr. R. B. Adams has taken charge of the Chatham Post Office on Monday morning last. We know that this appointment will not be without its advantages, by which the supporters of the Liberal Conservative party in Chatham, there being several applicants for the office far more entitled to it than the gentleman appointed, and who have asserted that party ever since confirmation, and whose claims have received favorable consideration at the hands of the government.

An adjourned meeting of the St. John Presbytery was held in St. Andrew's church, St. John, on Tuesday morning, the moderator, Rev. A. Macdonald, in the chair. Rev. Messrs. Macrae, Bruce, Bennett, Murray, Gray, Stuart, Stewart, Johnston and Calder were present. After the routine business of the committee was submitted and adopted. While the next matter, Rev. Mr. Allen's case was being discussed, the clerk refused to give any information as to what decision the Presbytery arrived at, but it is understood that the injunction placed upon Rev. Mr. Allen at the last meeting of the Presbytery, was removed, and that the clerk was instructed to forward him the usual certificate as to his standing as a minister.

Donation Supplementary Estimate.

Supplementary estimates for the current fiscal year were brought down. They amount to \$2,651,926. The supplementary estimates for 1886-7, are yet to come down. Over a million dollars additional are required for the Northwest rebellion expenditure; \$200,000 additional for the fisheries policy; \$200,000 to meet the expenses connected with the franchise bill; \$50,000 additional for the colonial exhibition; \$100,000 for pensions to wounded military; \$200,000 to the Pacific Railway Company to complete the British Columbia section; \$15,000 for maritime province railways; \$200,000 additional for Indians; \$10,000 for Northwest mounted police; \$7,000 for surveys by the Rail, and \$30,000 to meet expenses of publishing the consolidated statutes.

Dropped Dead in the Plough Field.

Mr. Zebadiah Estabrooks, an old farmer of Cowar Horton, Sunbury Co., fell dead in his plough field on the Queen's birthday. He was engaged driving the team while his son held the plough, and when they had about finished their work of ploughing, the old man staggered and fell across the beam of the plough. When his son lifted him up life was extinct. Mr. Estabrooks was upwards of eighty years of age, but determined and resolute and always anxious to do his share of the work about the farm. He leaves a large family connection in nearly all the river counties.

Accident in Margerville.

On Saturday last, Mr. John Wason, of Margerville, was helping his neighbors, Mr. Habbitt, to shingle a new building, when he lost his foothold on the roof and fell back. He struck his head against a block, breaking one of his ribs and receiving other severe internal injuries. Mr. Wason was a great sufferer from Sunday until the arrival of Dr. Currie from Fredericton. Mr. Wason has since been removed to this city to receive medical care and attendance.

ARREST OF MR. WOODBRIDGE.

And His Assistant Teachers at the Institution of R. Abell, of St. John.

Chief of police Rawlings of Portland, St. John, accompanied by officer McGrath, arrived in town on Tuesday evening and immediately proceeded to the Fredericton deaf and dumb institution and placed under arrest Mr. Woodbridge, the principal of the school, Mr. Geo. S. Powers, an assistant teacher, and a young fellow named Ernest Hagerman, of Carleton Co., a pupil in the school, on serious charges preferred against them by A. H. Abell, principal of the deaf and dumb school in St. John. Ball was easily procured for their appearance and yesterday morning they accompanied the officers to St. John. Messrs Woodbridge and Powers are accused by Abell of having on the 21st of April last and on the 1st of May attempted to destroy by fire his premises in Portland. A deaf mute named Dryden has also made a charge against Powers for poisoning and discharging a revolver at him. The St. John Globe says that "the warrants were handed over to Chief of Police Rawlings at the time they were made out, after which the police were informed that the accused parties were at South Bay where they were secreted. The persons by Abell the officers proceeded to the place, but they were informed that they were looking for but not being in that neighborhood for about a year, the investigation the charges will reveal the true condition of affairs concerning Abell and the numerous charges he is constantly preferring against Mr. Woodbridge, his associates, and his school."

The accused appeared before Police Magistrate Tapley, but the case was adjourned until Thursday of next week. The St. John Globe says that shortly after Messrs. Woodbridge, Powers and Hagerman left the Portland police station, Sergeant Hastings arrested Powers on a warrant charging him with assault and battery on one of Abell's pupils last July. Powers was taken to the police station, but Mr. Woodbridge accompanying him. The necessary bail was procured, and the charges against Powers will be inquired into this afternoon.

Police Court.

Simon O'Leary was fined \$5 for being drunk, but on failing to deposit the amount was sent to jail for eight days.

Drives.

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New Mode of Planting Potatoes.

To the Editor of The Glazier.

Sir:—A novel mode of raising potatoes without plowing or harrowing the ground, and also without hoeing or digging, is to drop the seed upon sod land in the ordinary manner, in hills, drills, or broadcast, then cover with straw, hay, or straw manure, or rubbish of any kind that is found about the house, and the seed will grow in the sod. Cover sufficiently deep to kill the grass that may rot and impart heat to the potato, which will better be planted whole and too large. The benefit to be derived from this mode of planting is a saving of labor—killing the sod, especially if it is a couchy, and rendering it easy to hoe the next season, when the covering of straw or rubbish is sufficiently rotten to be plowed in as a coat of manure. The harvesting is done with a rake, and the crop will be as clean as if washed. Try it, farmers, on a small scale and report to THE GLAZIER next autumn. I have seen it done many years ago by my father, for I am a Farmer's Son.
