The most of them who know the market best are content to act as brokers and help foolish people a thousand miles out of touch with the market to lose their money on long range shots, but they never risk their own. Yet the man in Wall street has a hundred chances of making money to the one that the amateur dabbler in stocks has in trying to play the market with limited information and "shine" tips in some small city or town hundreds of miles from the centre of operations. The chief danger and allurements of the stock market is that the amateur declines to recognize it as a pure gamble with the dealer and banker against him. He gets it into his head that he can "call the market" from certain information, when the fact is that he has about as much chance as rustic in a shell game. If it was possible to learn the market so as to be able to call the turn there are a thousand people working in Wall street on salary or commission to-day who would be millionaires. But that phase of it never seems to strike the lamb until he has been shorn.—Ottawa Citizen.
