WINNIPEG MARKET LETTER

(Office of The Grain Growers' Grain Company, Ltd., August \$1, 1912.)

Wheat—Frices throughout the week until today have ruled fairly steady. The rainy weather through the West has held prices up, and today with a fine weather map October wheat is off one cent. Offerings of straight grade cash, wheat has been very light and this has kept the prices up. With the continuance of favorable weather it is likely the new crop wheat will be coming on the market at an early date, and some time, very soon, a re-adjustment of values between old and new crop must occur. With very heavy receipts in Minneapolis and American markets weak there is nothing to cause one to look for higher prices in the near future, and on that account we would advise shippers who may be holding old crop in store at the terminals to sell it at an early date.

Outs—Outs have been in good demand at slightly higher figures. Prices for this grain should continue good until we have a free movement of the new crop.

Barley—Barley has done a little better in price the last day or so, this advance being caused by Exporters having to get some of this grain to fill space.

Flax—Flax closes higher this week than a week ago. The trade in this grain is very light, prices some, days being almost nominal.

Winnipeg Live Stock

Stockyard Receipts

For the week ending Thursday night, August 19, the receipts at the local stockyards were as follows:—

Cattle, 1400, compared with 1898 the previous week, and \$599 a year ago; calves, \$11 last week and \$01 the previous week; hogs 1085 last week, 1588 the previous week, and 1076 a year ago; sheep, \$497 last week, \$19 a week ago and 1901 last year.

Cattle

The supply of cattle was away below the previous week and the demand has been good for all grades. While prices on most classes have advanced a little, there has been no \$6.00 cattle this week, the top price being \$5.65. Ten cars of pretty good butchers brought \$5.60. Hockers and feeders are still in good demand and dealers wish they had more in sight at the same figure. Best milkers and springers have advanced \$5.00 a head during the week, commanding \$70.00, while a few extra choice head were disposed of at \$75.00. Common milkers and springers have followed the advance of \$5.00 a head. The veal market was a little stronger this week, the best selling from \$6.50 to \$5.50.

Friday and Saturday the receipts continued light, and the market was firm all round.

The supply of hogs was lighter this week and prices soared up to the \$5.50 mark, some dealers disposing of all they could lay hands on at that fancy figure. The harvest time is blamed for the searcity and the probability is that prices will maintain this high level for some time.

Sheep and Lambs

Sheep prices declined during the week, the supply received heing three times as large as the previous week. The heavier consignments went direct to the packers. Best lambs are now quoted from \$6.00 to \$6.50 and heat sheep from \$4.50 to \$5.00.

Country Produce

Country Produce

Butter

The moderate weather has resulted in larger quantities of butter being received from the outlying districts than dealers were expecting during the harvest season, but no more has come in than could be easily disposed of. Fancy dairy maintains its 23 cent figure, but No. 1 dairy advanced from 20 to 22 cents. Good round lots are quoted at 18 to 20 cents, and the bulk of the receipts are of this class. Dealers are anxious to get more of the high grade quality, hence the advance in quotations. They point out that it would pay the farmers to produce the first class quality and thereby get 5 cents more a pound. From now on harvesting is expected to curtail the supplies.

Eggs

As forecasted last week, eggs advanced 2 cents a dozen, the quotation now standing at 24 cents. The supply in sight for Winnipeg is much below the demand. It is found that other towns, particularly divisional points on railways, are themselves drawing nearly all the available supply in their respective districts, so that merchants who formerly shipped-to Winnipeg cannot gather up more than required for their own customers and so have stopped sending any to Winnipeg. The point seems to be that 24 cents is not an abnormal figure, considering the supply in sight, and that a lower level is very doubtful unless the high price stimulates more attention to the poultry.

Polatoes

Potatoes are still being dumped into the local market by the carload, and prices have declined to 40 cents, Winnipeg. As they will not keep long this weather in their present state dealers claim they are unable to offer more than this low figure as they are selling them as low as 50 cents. The potatoes so far received are not the full grown ones, which will be worth more. However, as there is a big crop this year, low prices are looked for during the coming season.

Milk and Cream

With September 1 a new schedule of quotations on milk and cream comes in force. Sweet cream advances from 27 to 30 cents, and sour cream for butter-making from 24 to 25 cen

Owing to Monday, Sept. 2, being a public holiday in Winnipeg it was necessary to go to press with The Guide earlier than usual this week. The market reports are therefore not as late as usual.
