N motion of Mr. M'Nider, seconded by Mr. Grant, the bill formaking, repairing and altering the roads and Bridges within this Province, and for repealing certain laws therein mentioned, was read for the first time.

Ordered, that the faid bill be read a fecond time on Friday next. On the motion of Mr. Richardson, seconded by Mr. Frobisher.

Ordered, that Mr. Richardson have leave to bring in a bill, for better regulating the weight and rates at which certain coins shall pass current in this Province; for preventing the falsifying, counterfeiting or impairing the same, and for repealing the Act or Ordinance therein mentioned.

He accordingly presented the said bill to the House, and the same.

was received and read for the first time.

Ordered, That the faid bill be read a second time on Fuesday next.

On motion of Mr. M' Nider, seconded by Mr. Lester,

Resolved, that an humble address be presented to his Excellency the Governor praying his Excellency will be pleased to order to be laid before this House, copies of the papers containing the information he received from the different parts of this Province, prior to the 10th of September last, respecting the scarcity of grain in this Province.

Ordered, that Messieurs M'Nider, M'Gill, De Salaberry, Digé, O'Hara and Marcoux do carry the said address to his Excellency the Governor.

On motion of Mr. Frobisher, seconded by Mr. M. Nider, the House adjourned till Monday next.

M'Gill, accompanied by the other meffengers, reported, that in obedience to the order of the House, they had waited upon his Excellency the Governor General, with the address of this House of Friday last, and that his Excellency had been pleased to inform them, that he would give orders to lay the papers respecting the scarcity of grain in this Province, before the House.
