The Austro-Italian campaign furnished little news of special importance, but some gains for the Italians were reported Another zeppelin raid was made on England, ten enemy airships being engaged, one of which was brought down in flames north of London, the zeppelin be ing completely destroyed and its crew charred beyond recognition. Two other airships of the fleet were driven off; and the damage inflicted by all of them appears to have been only slight.

The week witnessed great activity the part of German submarines, which secured many victims among Britis French, Italian, and neutral merchan vessels. The disasters reported are given in "News of the Sea."

In Canada as a whole there has been a slackening in recruiting, the National Service Board having been too recently appointed to make its effectiveness apparent. Major L. P. D. Tilley has been appointed organizer for New Brunswick under the Board and it is probable that registration will soon begin in New Brunswick and through out Canada. We are a long way short of our 500,000 men, and present recruiting does not equal wastage. #### ADMINISTRATION OF JUSTICE IN ST. ANDREWS

THE people of St. Andrews were great ly surprised on Monday last when they learned that Frank Loring, who had been in jail for some weeks awaiting trial on the charge of aiding soldiers to desert, had been acquitted by Judge Carleton. Of the man's guilt there was no doubt in To all parts of Canada, per annum \$1.50 the minds of the people of the Town, or the persons who brought the charge, of \$2.00 the magistrate who committed him to jail, and of the prosecuting attorney. The payment is made strictly in advance a Judge evidently held a different view, or thought that the charge had not been pro perly laid, as the soldiers concerned had not actually deserted; and, anyway, that the authorities had set a trap to catch the suspected culprit-a course of procedure which the Judge deemed illegal. Had the man been convicted by the Judge he could have appealed, and the Judge's decision would, in that event, have been subject to review: but on his being acquitted, the only course open to the Crown (short o the impeachment of the Judge) was to prefer a new charge against the suspected man.
