PROGRESS OF THE WAR

(September 28 to October 4)

On the last day of the week under review the war entered the twenty-seventh month of its course. The week was one of intense activity at many points on the wide-flung battle-fronts, the Entente Allies having nearly everywhere the advantage.

In the Western campaign the fighting on the Somme front was the feature of greatest interest. The British advanced considerably on their entire front from Thiépval to a point east of Combes, where their forces join those of the French.

In the Eastern campaign there was some activity on the whole front, but the fiercest fighting in great force took place southeast of Lemberg, where the Russians made substantial gains on their Teutonic foes.

The Balkan campaign was prosecuted with great vigor on all fronts, and everywhere with substantial success for the Entente Allies. In the Province of Dobruja the Rumanians and Russians succeeded in repelling the Bulgars.

The Austro-Italian campaign furnished little news of special importance, but some gains for the Italians were reported. Another zeppelin raid was made on England, ten enemy airships being engaged, one of which was brought down in flames north of London.

The week witnessed great activity on the part of German submarines, which secured many victories among British, French, Italian, and neutral merchant vessels. The disasters reported are given in "News of the Sea."

THE QUESTION OF THE HOUR

THE question of the hour, all other questions being only of minor importance, is that of recruits. In Canada as a whole there has been a slackening in recruiting, the National Service Board having been too recently appointed to make its effectiveness apparent.
