The Chief said: "In view of the fact that petitions had been presented by a arge number of ratepayers and citizens to increase the number of men on the force, he would thus be in a position to give the city better police protection." The Chief said that the beats "at present were too long for the force to patrol," and made an earnest plea for the Commissioner to add two more men to the force The Chief referred to the recent disturbances, and hoped there would be no reoccurrence

Hits the Papers The Chief took a sly dig at the papers, saying that "if the papers don't stop there will be a murder.' Another Motion

It was made by Magistrate Livingston (but not seconded) that the men up to and including the sergeants be given an advance in salary of 20c per day. The chief to be paid \$2,000 per year and the police court clerk \$1,000 per year. This motion fell flat as the Judge and the Mayor would not entertain the proposition for a minute. Judge Hardy said he could not see his way clear to give Chief Slemir any more than \$100 per year raise.

Mayor Hartman objected too, say ing that he thought a "half measure was better than none," and the Chief who was receiving \$1,800, was very well paid. The Mayor said "he was in sympathy with the men receiving better wages, but had none for those

higher up."

Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation on the innd in each of three-years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside upon the homestead or pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (heldding the time required to earn homestead patent), and cultivate 50 acres extra


