

Give Assurance of Defence **Against Attacks of Cen**tral Powers

CHECKMATE INTRIGUE Hour of Reconciliation Has Arrived, Says High Commissioner

Athens, June 18 .- Z. M. Journart, High Commissioner, representing France, Great Britain and Russia, who recently brought about the abdication of King Constantine, has published the following proclamation, addressed to the Hellenes:

"France, Great Britain and Russia desired the independence, greatness and prosperity of Greece. They intend to defend the brave little land they have liberated against the united efforts of the Turks, Bulgarians and Germans. They are here to checkmate the manoeuvres of hereditary enemies of the Kingdom. They will put an end to the reperted violation of the constitution, of treaties, and the deplorable intrigues which led up to the massacre of soldiers of the al-

of Athens, and was gradually lead-ing the people under the yoke of the Bulgarians and Germans. We resolved to re-establish the constitutional rights and unity of Greece. The protecting powers, therefore, demanded the abdication of the King. They have no intention of tampering with the constitutional prerogatives; they have other aims, namely, to assure the regular and constitutional pro-gress of the country, to which the late King George of glorious memory had always been scrupulously faithful, but which King Constantine had

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
