**MILITARISM IN PUBLIC SCHOOLS?**

**Trades and Labor Council Opposes Cadet Movement For That Reason**

**WANT MORE INQUESTS**

Condemnation of the school cadet movement, the mayor's relations to Brantford labor men, the coroner and the inquest problem and organization matters were the subjects brought up and discussed at the business session of the Trades and Labor Council last night.

Blue Label Goods  
That the city's retailers are almost deplorably devoid of union-made goods, was the report of the label committee, and where "label" goods could be brought they were hand-me-downs, made years ago and were selling at prohibitive prices. In one case a clothing man asked "only \$80" for a suit of clothes. In the committee's opinion there was but one store in the city selling union-made shoes. One brand of label hats alone were selling here in very limited quantities.

The Mayor and the Bolshevik  
The committee inquiring into the charges made by Felix Conosovitch concerning Mayor Macleod, asked that the matter be dropped, as the police had already dealt with the Russian. Others believed that Conosovitch had not been treated democratically by the Mayor. The report was received and the committee dismissed.

The "Man-and-woman-power" registration bulletin sent by Tom Moore, was read by the secretary, and was ordered received and filed. Delegate vice-president, A. A. James was appointed to attend the Labor Educational Convention in Niagara Falls on the 24th and 25th of May.

Believing that military training of school boys was only encouraging militarism, Delegate Kite, supported by Delegate Price, drew up a resolution in opposition to the school cadet movement.

Militarism is the curse of civilization, was the conviction of the labor man, "and the burden of war falls most heavily upon the workingman. In encouraging the public school cadet corps we are merely stealing Prussian militarism from the originators."  
The resolution asked that military school training be stopped. The resolution was voted on and carried a large majority of delegates favoring its principles.

Rev. H. C. Light spoke on the death of little Eleanor Thompson, who was killed by an automobile last week. No inquest has been held. This, Rev. Mr. Light criticized, and endorsed the action of the T. and L. Council in urging that an investigation be made. There was a tendency for conditions to become worse and the speaker offered his services in the investigation.

For Mr. Light's information, Secretary McGrattan gave an outline of the proceedings in the Crutcher's case. This fatality was practically in the same class as last week's case. The former case will be pushed with vigor by the Labor Council.

"The T. and L. Council want nobody's scalp," said the secretary. "It's justice we want."  
Affidavits of witnesses in the last fatality will be secured by the committee in charge.

Delegate J. F. Marsh, representative of the Frontier District Council, Niagara Falls, Ont., made an appeal for more union carpenters in Brantford. Mr. Marsh asked for assistance in properly organizing the local carpenters.

A meeting of all members of the wood-working trade will be held next Monday night at the Labor hall, Bank of Hamilton building, for the purpose of hearing Delegate Marsh and others present the organization proposition.

Amongst other matters of minor consequence the financial secretary congratulated the financial secretary for his good work on behalf of the council. He had obtained numerous chairs at a knocked-down price and saved \$44.36 on the gas bill. Local applause was given Delegate McGrattan.

In an action at Owen Sound of Barry v. Haddad, Assyrian, residents of Byrne Inlet, for slander, the jury gave \$1000 a verdict which clears him of the suspicion of incendiarism, and damages of \$100 against Haddad.

**WON \$50,000 AND WAS RECONCILED TO BEAUTIFUL WIFE**  
**New Yorker Gets Verdict in Alienation Suit, And Wins Back Love**  
New York, May 15.—In the suit of Louis J. Kahn, head of a large importing house on Forty-second street, against Philip Goldston, wealthy son of a garment manufacturer, for \$50,000 damages for the alienation of the affections of Mrs. Kahn, a jury in Justice Cothan's court gave a verdict to the plaintiff for the full amount.  
The suit was unusual in that, as the defendant did not appear in court, the jurors had the pleasure

of hearing that the husband had forgiven the repentant wife and that they intended hereafter to be inseparable.  
Beauty Draws Crowds.  
In the course of the testimony it was shown that Mrs. Kahn, before her marriage a few years ago, substituted as saleswoman for a friend in a Sixth avenue department store, but that on account of her rare beauty she was more of a hindrance than a help to the establishment and she had to quit. She was so pretty it was said at the time, that business halted on account of the customer's paying more attention to her than to buying articles.  
Mrs. Kahn in her testimony said that young Goldston, to whom she was properly introduced, made such ardent love to her both in conversation and by letter that her head was completely turned. She said he declared that he was "a divorced man

who married at too early an age." Later, she said, she discovered that he had a wife and two beautiful children.  
As part of the evidence introduced by the erring wife to aid her husband in collecting \$50,000 from Goldston for temporary loss of her affections, the jury was permitted to see a number of letters written to Mrs. Kahn when Goldston was on a trip to the Pacific coast. Among the extracts from the letters were the following lines, written, the jury thought, for the purpose of weaning Mrs. Kahn's affections from her husband.  
"This is a letter from a man hopelessly in love with a woman. I think it amuses you to set men's hearts on fire and then at a safe distance watch the flames."  
Money His Curse.  
"Money has been my curse and ruination. I never had to earn it."

Here are other extracts:  
"You are another's. I have my ties, too. It is maddening. You are weak when you love, but it is because you are a woman. Some day you will be mine before all the world."  
"To play with a woman's heart is playing a dangerous game. A vain, flirtatious woman is like a thief who breaks into the temple of a man's soul and steals the golden vessels of his belief in womanhood. Such vandals make all women seem unloved and untrue. They shelter the ideals that most men still possess, no matter how worldly they are."  
"Destroy this letter. Safety first!"
