UNCONDITIONAL TURK SURRENDER

UNCONDITIONAL SURRENDER LONDON, OCT. 31.—(CANADIAN PRESS DISPATCH FROM REUTERS.)—TURKEY HAS SURRENDERED UNCONDITIONALLY. REUTERS AGENCY HAS BEEN INFORMED THAT GREAT BRITAIN HAS OFFICIALLY RECEIVED DEFINITE PEACE PROPOSALS FROM TURKEY WHICH ARE REGARDED AS TANTAMOUNT TO UNCONDITIONAL SURRENDER.

Unconditional Surrender Will Be Only Allied Condition

ROOSEVELT AND TAFT ASK FOR ELECTION OF REPUBLICAN CONGRESS

Appeal to U.S. Public to Place Control in New Hands

UNIQUE MANIFESTO

New York, Oct. 31.—Theodore Roosevelt and William H. Taft issued here a joint appeal for the election of a Republican majority in Congress.

"We approach this subject as Americans and only as Americans. When this war broke out we would have welcomed action by the President which would have eliminated all questions of party politics.

"The next Congress will serve from March 4, 1919, to March 4, 1921. In that period:

"First—The war must be fought to unconditional surrender, unless this is achieved before.

"Second—The terms of world peace must be settled.

"Third—The Democratic administration after expending billions of treasure and exercising more absolute power than any administration in our history, must give an account of its stewardship.

"Fourth—The change from war conditions to peace must be brought about with the least disturbance, and the work of reconstruction must be broadly begun.

"A Republican Congress will be much better qualified than one controlled by Democrats to aid the country in adopting the measures needed.

"The new Senate must be composed of two-thirds vote, the terms of peace one man only. It is one-man control we are fighting in this war.

"If the peace treaty is to be useful in the future, it must be approved by the great body of the American people. The President has indicated a willingness to make a peace by negotiations. He has not demanded, as he might have done in three lines, that which the American people demand, an unconditional surrender. His exchange of notes with Germany has caused a deep concern among our people lest he may

COUNT ANDRASSY, the foreign minister of Austria-Hungary, who has sent a note to United States Secretary of State Lansing, requesting the secretary's intervention with President Wilson for an immediate armistice on all fronts, and for the commencement of peace negotiations.

During the operations in front of Amiens during August of this year, this battalion captured a number of field guns and machine guns. We have a number of officers and men from your city in this unit, and in view of the gallant work done by them during these operations, we would ask you to accept on behalf of the battalion, a 5.9 German howitzer, number 373, carriage number 915, in which we have asked the officer in charge of trophies to forward you.

ENTIRE ITALIAN FRONT IS ABLAZE

British Forces Have Entered Asiago, And Are Continuing Progress on Piave — The Enemy Retreat Continues

London, Oct. 31.—(Italian front).—The entire Italian front is ablaze, a Central News despatch from Rome says.

British troops have entered Asiago, according to another report from the British War Office, covering the operations early Wednesday.

The statement also reports continued progress by the Third, Tenth, Eighth and Twelfth armies along the Piave. The statement reads:

"The advance continued this morning. The Tenth army has reached a line two miles east of Ormelie, the western edge of Lustrano, Albina, Odoigne and Vendimano and is continuing the advance. In yesterday's operations the yeomanry captured more than 200 prisoners.

"The Third army has crossed the Piave south of the Tenth army. The advance of the Eighth and Twelfth armies is proceeding rapidly. Vittorio has been occupied by the Eighth army.

FOCH'S ARMISTICE TERMS HAVE REACHED BERLIN-AUSTRIA STILL SEEKING PEACE

Conditions In Dual Monarchy Are Critical; Kaiser Willing To Submit To Curtailment of His Power; German Empress Would Have Her Husband Abdicate, Fears Revolution

LONDON, Oct. 31.—Marshal Foch's armistice terms arrived in Berlin Tuesday night, The Vossische Zeitung of Berlin says it learns, according to an Exchange Telegraph dispatch from Copenhagen.

TURKEY TO MAKE ANOTHER PLEA A note from Turkey asking for peace is expected momentarily by the Allied Governments, The Daily Express says it understands. The allies, the newspaper adds, will demand complete and unconditional surrender.

TO CURTAIL KAISER'S POWER COPENHAGEN, Oct. 31.—Request was made by the Socialist members of the lower house of the German Reichstag on Tuesday that the ministry obtain the Emperor's consent to a change in the article of the constitution which gives him the right to make war and peace.

PANIC IN BUDAPEST Zurich, Wednesday, Oct. 30.—The rapid advance of the allies in Serbia is causing the liveliest alarm in Budapest, according to a Vienna dispatch. It is feared that the Jugo-Slavs will cross the Croatian frontier, join the allied troops and march on the city.

CANNOT HOLD FIUME PARIS, Oct. 31.—The military governor at Fiume recently advised the Hungarian government that he was without material and munitions, and unable to defend the city. He received orders to hand over the administration to the Croatian national council, which he did immediately.

EMPRESS DEMANDS KAISER'S ABDICATION The German Empress is very ill and weak, according to a Berne dispatch today to The Petit Journal. It is said that she is haunted by the memory of the Russian revolution and insists upon the abdication of the Emperor.

By Courier Leased Wire New York, Oct. 31.—The Associated Press this morning issued the following: "Because of our desire for peace, our troops in Italy will evacuate occupied regions," says an official statement at Vienna late last night.

As regards the front of more than 60 miles from the Adriatic to the mountain front west of the Piave River, it would appear that this statement seeks to make a virtue of a necessity, so far as the withdrawal of Austrian forces is concerned.

The French, who have been attacking the German lines between the Oise and the Aisne rivers, are slowly encircling Guise. Further south they have cut another notch into the German front.

Northwest of Rethel, the Germans appear to have strengthened their line to meet the dangerous attack of General Berthelot's troops, which, if it had been a success would have outflanked the German lines along the Aisne.

In the northern sectors of the front the situation seems to have reached a stage of deadlock for the time being. British divisions have reached the Scheidt along a wide front, but have been unable to cross that stream. The presence of civilians in many of the towns in this sector of the battle front may have some bearing on the lull that has prevailed there for the last few days.

ITALIANS TAKE ODERZO; BRITISH REACH LIVENSA RIVER EAST OF PIAVE

Allied Forces Continue Their Progress in Drive Against the Austro-Germans FRESH GAINS TODAY

By Courier Leased Wire London, Oct. 30.—The British forces fighting east of the Piave have reached the Livenza river at Francenigo, and the Italians have occupied Oderzo, according to an official on operations in Italy, issued at the war office today.

The text of the statement reads: "The advance of the Tenth army continued without check throughout the day. British cavalry detachments, in close touch with Italian cavalry, have reached the western outskirts of Sacle.

Troops of the Fourteenth British corps have reached the Livenza river at Francenigo.

ITALIAN OFFICIAL Rome, Wednesday, Oct. 30.—Oderzo has been reached by Allied troops advancing east of the Piave River and Serravalle has been taken, according to the official statement issued at the War Office to-night. The text of the statement reads:

"Our armies are continuing to rapidly advance after the retreating enemy who has attempted in vain to retard them. Heads of our columns have reached Serravalle or Orsago, Gajardo and Oderzo.

"Cavalry divisions are advancing in the plains and some squadrons to-day entered Sacle.

"In overcoming strong resistance between the Piave and the Monticano, the third army has fought brilliantly. The river crossing at Ponti di Piave was carried in a fierce action. The enemy was obliged to evacuate Asiago, which was promptly occupied.

"During the rush of the advance it has been impossible to keep count of the thousands of prisoners and many guns. Besides the populations of towns and villages we have liberated numbers of Italian prisoners who have been in Austrian hands."

Austrians to Withdraw Vienna, Wednesday, Oct. 30, via London.—Austrian troops fighting on Italian soil will be withdrawn, according to an official statement issued by the War Office to-night. The text of the statement reads:

"Taking into account the resolve so often expressed to bring about a conclusion of an armistice and peace, putting an end to the struggle of nations, our troops fighting on Italian soil will evacuate occupied regions.

"In the Italian theatre there has been only minor fighting activity on the Tyrolean front. Between the Brenta and the Piave Rivers fresh troops with unexampled forces attacked Monte Asolone and Montebelluna. Our troops with unexampled and soldierly faithfulness brought all the enemy's efforts to naught."

MONTE CISON TAKEN At Italian Headquarters on the Piave, Wednesday, Oct. 30.—(By the Associated Press)—Allied troops have taken Monte Cison. This was a most important operation for by it the roads were opened to Feltre and Vittorio.

Both these cities were Austrian bases. The capture of Monte Cison also divides the Austrian army forces. (Continued on page five)

NO LIQUOR SHORTAGE

All City's Whiskey Can be Accounted For, Says the Mayor

His Worship Mayor MacBride was in a mathematical mood this morning when questioned by The Courier as to the city's liquor supply, and after a few moments figuring on paper announced that approximately 2,600 six-ounce prescriptions had been filled by local druggists. Two of the five kegs obtained by the city at the outbreak of the epidemic have been dispensed to the druggists, and the remaining three are under guard in the market house.

"The rumor monger is rampant in Brantford," said the Mayor in reference to rumors of a shortage in the whiskey. "Every drop which goes out is accounted for. The druggists are allowed to sell the liquor only on a doctor's prescription, and then only in six-ounce quantities. In this way some 30 gallons, or 2,600 prescriptions, have been disposed of."
