The insincerity of this statement was fully exposed when every Liberal in the House voted against Hon. Mr. Cochrane's Highways Bill. Laurier fooled the farmer for a long time but his fooling days are over.

THE EMPIRE WOULD SUFFER IN PRESTIGE

In view of his past utterances the present attitude of Sir Wilfrid Laurier and his followers is apparently quite incomprehensible to the British press and people.

Commenting on the possible blocking of the Naval Bill by the Senate at Laurier's dictation, the London Daily Telegraph had the following to say the other day:

"The whole Empire will suffer in prestige if the Imperial aid offered by the Canadian Government is after all withheld by a vote of the Senate, as Laurier's speech suggests. The mere possibility of such an affront to a responsible cabinet and to the ideal it cherishes ought to be avoided at all costs."

Avonport Brick Works

Works are now well in progress at the Avonport Brick Yard which was conducted so successfully for over 35 years by Jacob Walton, Esq. of Canada. The yard has not been sold, but is now being managed by H. G. Harris, of Kentville. Mr. George Brooks, of Avonport, who has had a long experience in brick-making at Avonport is foreman and none but the best bricks will be manufactured. The yard having been idle for two years, considerable repairs and alterations are required obtainable is now being shipped to Avonport to be installed this year. By the first of June, brick making will be in full operation. The Avonport Brick yard at Avonport owned by the Nova Scotia Clay Co., will not be operated this year.

Properties Sold

Mrs. Charles E. Starr has sold her farm at Pereau, to Mr. Arthur Pilcher of Great Britain.
