H. M. S. Russell Strikes Mine and Sinks in Mediterranean

London, April 28—The British battleship Russell has been sunk by a mine. Admiral Fremantle, the captain of the Russell, twenty-four officers and 676 men were saved. Under ordinary conditions the Russell carried between 700 and 800 men. About 124 men from the Russell are missing. The warship was sunk in the Mediterranean.

The Russell was laid down in 1899, and completed in 1903. She was 405 feet long, 45 feet beam, 26 feet deep, and displaced 14,000 tons. She was armed with four 12 inch, twelve six inch, twelve 3 inch and six 2 pound guns, and four torpedo tubes. She cost about \$5,000,000. A German submarine was sunk off the East coast yesterday it was announced officially today. Eighteen men of the submarine were captured.

Germans Plan Great Offensive Against Anglo-French Forces

Paris, April 28—That the German military and naval staffs are preparing a great offensive both against the combined Anglo-French army on the continent and the fleet on the coast of Great Britain in a last, desperate bid for victory, is the conclusion arrived at by Major de Civrieux, the military critic of the Matin, after a close study of the military factors of the situation.

The simultaneous occurrence, he adds of Zeppelin raids, the risky North Sea naval expedition, and the unexpected outbreak in Dublin are not mere coincidences. At the same time, he points out, the Swiss frontier has been closed for three weeks, while on the French front in Lorraine and in the Vosges the Germans are renewing partial demonstrations in the hope of dividing the attention of the French Staff.

There is one principle that the German Staff will never abandon, Major Civrieux concludes, unless under absolute necessity, and that is the retention of the strategic initiative. It is aware of the Allies common designs and is exerting all its energies to forestall them.

Attack on the British Front Promises to Rival that on the French at Verdun.

Bulletin—London, April 28, 1.31 a. m.—Great activity at various points along the British front is reported in the latest official communication. The Bedfordshire Regiment carried on a successful raid near Carnoy. There has been artillery activity at La Boisselle, Hebuterne, Monchy-Au-Bois, Neuville-St. Vaast, and Frelingheim. At Frelingheim the Germans entered the British trenches but were driven out.

Similar attacks on the British trenches on Hill 60 and at St. Eloi were repulsed.

The communication closes with an account of the aeroplane activity, including a description of a fight between a German "two-seater" and a British "one seater", resulting in the death of both German aviators and the destruction of the machine, which fell from a height of 14,000 feet.

Lieut. Hazen Killed By a Premature Explosion of Fuse

London, April 26—Information now received shows that the death of Lieut. Hazen, son of the Canadian Minister of Marine and Fisheries, was caused by the premature explosion of a time fuse on which he was engaged.
