JAPAN'S AIM TO MAKE IT HOT FOR THE HUN.
 NEW YORK, Sept. 28.—Japan is in
 the war to "make herself as unpleasant
 to the enemy as her physical make-up
 will permit or her ingenuity conceive,"
 declared Viscount Ishii, head of the
 Imperial Japanese commission, at the
 New York Chamber of Commerce here
 today. His country, he said, is ally
 and partner in the war which could be
 brought only "by the complete utter
 physical defeat and humiliation of
 Germany," and Japan will do her share
 "in such manner as to justify her in
 claiming a place in the company of
 honest men."

 Prices for ordinary stock range from
 \$2.50 to \$2.75 in car lots. Spies are
 selling at \$4.50; Gravensteins, \$2.50
 to \$3. Some orchards sold the tree
 run at from \$2 to \$2.50 per barrel.
 Potatoes area moderate crop this year
 and are selling at \$3.25 per barrel.
 It is reported that 80 percent of the
 cranberries crop has been lost by an
 early frost.
