FIVE Eaten By Dogs.

St. John's, Newfoundland, June 4.—Reports from Labrador state that five persons were killed and eaten by savage dogs on that coast during the past winter. One of the victims this winter was a man aged 85, and the others were an elderly man and his wife, daughter and grandchild.

BARGAIN BAITED DUPES

Alluring Offers Attracted a Flow of Cash.

Woodstock Man Arrested and Charged With Fraud—Non-Existent "Co-operative Society" Was Successful Through Extensive Advertising—E. Hull & Sons, Nurserymen, St. Catharines, Caused the Arrest.

Woodstock, June 4.—"For sale—sugar 12 lbs. best granulated sugar for one dollar; also everything you eat, wear or use at wholesale, no matter where you live. Co-operation pays the freight and saves you one-third. Send for list First National Co-operative Society, Woodstock, Ont."

The foregoing advertisement, inserted in various Canadian papers, attracted attention, it would seem from results, all over Canada.

High Constable Boyle, St. Catharines, and Constable Hill of this city went to Beachville and took Arthur Smith of Hicrest Farm into custody. Saturday morning the prisoner was taken to St. Catharines to answer to a charge of obtaining money under false pretences, with intent to defraud.

The arrest led to the uncovering of some strange doings. Circular letters, it is said, have been sent broadcast over the country by means of the mails, advertising "seed potatoes," which sold in the old country in 1903 for \$7,000 per stone (14 pounds), colts dogs, imported hogs, strawberry plants, and other things almost as varied and numerous as it is possible to imagine. This circular was directly responsible for the arrest of Arthur Smith.

In addition to the circular, a publication known as The Canadian Co-operative Operator, was published monthly and sent out, advertising everything "from a needle to an anchor," the choice of goods being as great as is found in the biggest department store in the land. Groceries are given particular attention, and prices are quoted away below those which the manufacturers quote to the wholesalers. Granulated sugar cannot be bought at 33 lbs. for a dollar in Canada, but the unsuspecting were duped right and left, and money orders, postal notes, registered letters, bank drafts, etc., have been coming to the Woodstock postoffice for months, only to be sent to the dead letter office and returned to the senders.

The First National Co-operative Society could not be located by the authorities here, and an inspector of the Postoffice Department came here to investigate the society. It was decided, for some reason not known to the local police, not to prosecute the concern.

The "First National" has no office in this city, but mail addressed to the concern found its way into Smith's hands, and he is held responsible.

Chief Zeas has received many communications from people who have been duped, and in some cases the dupes have even come to this city to try to recover their money. The mails were extensively used, and farmers seemed to be the special mark.

Trial on Tuesday.

St. Catharines, June 4.—A. W. Smith of Beachville, charged with fraud, who was arrested at his home by High Constable Boyle at 1 o'clock Saturday morning, appeared before the magistrate and was remanded until Tuesday.

LIFE'S MISERIES.

Death of Former Georgetown Man Due to Business Worry.

Cornwall, June 4.—O. W. Young returned home Saturday from attending the funeral of his brother, Joseph E. Young, Cumberland, B. C., whose remains were interred at the old family home, Georgetown, Ont.

The deceased took his own life at Duluth, Minn., on May 28 in a fit of despondency due to a prolonged case in court causing him to be away from home to the detriment of his affairs at a most critical season in the fruit business, in which he was interested.

The deceased was a son of the late James Young, formerly manager of the Toronto Paper Co. at Cornwall, and was born at Georgetown, Ont., 43 years ago. He was for many years treasurer of the Rat Portage Lumber Co. at Kenora, Ont. Since last March he had been treasurer of the Cumberland B. C. Development Co. and incidentally worked a fruit ranch which he owned in that district.

He is survived by his wife, one sister, Mrs. Chambers of Stroud, Eng., and three brothers, C. W. Young, Cornwall; Clarence Young, manager of the Merchants Bank, Brampton; and R. E. Young, superintendent of railway lands, Interior Department, Ottawa.

Advise Pope to Yield.

Paris, June 4.—All accounts agree that the result of the private convocation of Catholic bishops to advise the Pope in regard to accepting the new laws for the separation of church and state was a substantial majority favorable to the popular and Parliamentary decision. The most reliable version is that the bishops voted to accept the law authorizing public worship associations by a majority of twenty-two out of a total of seventy-four votes.

Arrested in Windsor.

Windsor, June 4.—J. Greenbaum was arrested here charged with stealing in London and in other places. Greenbaum went to the warehouse of R. C. Struthers & Co., London, last Thursday, accompanied by a woman, and after leaving there a piece of silk valued at \$45 was missing. When arrested Greenbaum had in his possession silk valued at \$700 and \$800. All the silk found was Canadian.

Henley Entries.

London, June 4.—The foreign entries for the Henley regatta closed Saturday. Besides W. B. West of Philadelphia, the only transatlantic competitor was the Argonauts of Toronto.

New York, June 2.—A special to The Herald from Cambridge, Mass., says: Mrs. Wilhelmina Paton Fleming, who has achieved fame through her discovery of stars in connection with her

work as curator of astronomical photographs at the Harvard Observatory, has been elected a member of the Royal Astronomical Society of England, and is the first woman to receive such an honor. Her discovery of stars is the first by a woman.

MAKE WARLIKE PREPARATIONS.

Ute Indians in Colorado Will Fight Way to Canada.

Denver, Col., June 4.—Disheartened by the Government's management of the Ute reservation, about 500 Indians have assembled at Vernal, twenty-five miles north of the reservation, and are awaiting the opening of the mountain passes to the north, declaring that they will flee from Uncle Sam's control and take refuge in Canada, under the British flag, if they have to fight their way.

The Utes say: "We wish to go in peace, but if we cannot go in peace we will go anyhow, and the Great Spirit will guide us on our journey. We fear no one who gets in our path. It is for him to fear. Let all beware who oppose us."

Indian Woman 124 Years Old.

Montreal, June 4.—Married to her third husband in the year that Queen Victoria was crowned Queen of England, yet still living and enjoying good health, is the story of an old Indian woman at Seven Islands, on the north shore of the St. Lawrence. She is 124 years of age. Her sight is excellent and she still sews, she still smokes, and the only ailment of old age which has overcome her is with regard to walking. Her feet will no longer carry her.

Leopold Boss of the Congo.

Antwerp, June 4.—According to The Metropolitan, King Leopold is about to reply energetically to British interference in the Congo independent state, and to the accusation that foreigners are shut out of the Congo. His Majesty intends as a preface to royal decrees instituting reforms in the Congo State to publish a declaration that he alone is sovereign of the Congo, in which he will not permit interference or coercion.

Marches With the Veterans.

Belleville, June 4.—Forty years ago yesterday the 50th Regiment and Belleville Rifles of this city, left for Prescott to meet the Penitents. Yesterday the Veterans' Association, the 50th Regiment and No. 1 Co. of the 49th Regiment, two veterans of the rebellion of 1837 were present. Messrs. A. T. Pettie and William Blaine, Sir Mackenzie Bowell also marched with the veterans.

Changes In the Cabinet.

Ottawa, June 4.—Hon. Charles Fitzpatrick was appointed Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of Canada Saturday.

Hon. A. B. Aylesworth will be sworn in as Minister of Justice when Lord Grey returns from Toronto, and Rodolphe Lemieux, Solicitor-General.

Two Years for a Brute.

St. John, N. B., June 4.—George Heov, the negro who made a criminal assault on Mrs. Annie Bettie a few days ago, and narrowly escaped being lynched by the posse which captured him, pleaded guilty to the charge, and Saturday was sent to the penitentiary for two years.

Must Pay Full Fare.

Ottawa, June 4.—By an order-in-council any person other than an employee or holder of a duly authorized pass traveling on Government railways without payment of the established fare is liable to a penalty of fifty dollars.

G. T. R. and Its Employees.

Montreal, June 4.—Discussing labor matters, F. H. McGuigan, manager of the Grand Trunk Railway system, says: "The labor situation all around so far as the Grand Trunk is concerned, I think it is not unsatisfactory."

The average wage increase granted the engineers under the arbitration award is a little less than 6 per cent.

Canada's Aid to Japan.

Ottawa, June 4.—A cable having been received that no further relief will be required the Canadian fund for the Japanese sufferers will be closed. Including the Government grants of \$25,000 worth of flour, the Dominion has subscribed \$70,000 toward the famine fund.

"Toronto Life" Sold.

Toronto, June 4.—The National Agency Co. has purchased the controlling interest in the Toronto Life Insurance Co. for \$50,278.47.

The interest had been held by the National Trust Co. on behalf of York County Loan shareholders.

Struck by Lightning.

Kingston, June 4.—Frederick A. Perry, living about seven miles out, at Big Creek, lost his barn and the contents, consisting of about 3,000 bushels of oats, a threshing outfit and other articles. The barn was struck by lightning. Loss \$5,600, partly covered by insurance.

Chinese Fire on British Ship.

Hong Kong, June 4.—The British steamship Samul was fired on Saturday at Samshui, near Hong Kong within sight of the British gunboat Robin. The ship's supercargo was slightly wounded.
