## Mrs. Kirchhoff Made Life Member

Local Chapter Of Daughters Of Empire Honor Former Brandon Resident

The Easter of 1913 was made memorable in the history of the local chapter of the I.O.D.E. by the presentation of a life membership in the National Chapter of the order to Mrs. J. N. Kirchhoff, now of Ottawa, but for 30 years a valued and beloved resident of Western Manitoba. Mrs. Kirchhoff lived first in Souris and then removed to Brandon, since which time she was ever first in any helpful or charitable work for the city or surrounding district. The kindness and hospitality of senator and Mrs. Kirchhoff was unbounded, and their lovely home and garden was enjoyed by a large number of the residents of Brandon. This beautiful home was destroyed by fire in 1912 and so caused the permanent residence of Mr. and Mrs. Kirchhoff to be removed to Ottawa. Mrs. Kirchhoff held many important offices in the different societies of Brandon, and was one of the ladies chiefly interested in founding the local chapter of the I.O.D.E., therefore it seemed a fitting tribute that she should be made a National life member—the first one from Brandon. The Life Membership was accompanied by a jeweled badge, the emblem of the order. The address which was sent with the Life Membership and badge ran thus (in part):

## The Address.

Brandon, Mar. 18, 1913.

Dear Mrs. Kirchhoff: Alex Lewis, secretary of the Brandon Chapter I.O.D.E. you have been elected a Life Member of the National Chapter of Canada. Our Chapter took the liberty of making this nomination without obtaining your permission, but the hope is expressed that you will accept the nomination as a token of our affection for you, and our appreciation of the many good things you have done for the Brandon district and its people. We know that the one whose name among us so well exemplified the motto of our local chapter, "Loyalty and Charity."

The certificate of Life Membership will be forwarded to you from Toronto, and we are sending you by express today, the jeweled badge, the emblem of the order. We hoped to have had them presented to you by Mrs. Harris at Ottawa, but her absence prevented this. We want you to wear this badge, and to think of Brandon, and come to visit us whenever you can, for we miss you much.

Mrs. Kirchhoff's acceptance and reply arrived on Friday and was read at the special meeting of the I.O.D.E. on Saturday last. In part it was as follows: Ottawa, Easter Sunday, 1913.

My Dear Mrs. Cumberland: I cannot tell you in any words I know, of the great pleasure your letter gave me. It was such a surprise and no one can know what it means to me—this expression of affection and remembrance—for I love Brandon and all its people most truly and dearly. We lived through the beautiful skies of the Western prairies, and it was the most terrible blow to us having our dear home there destroyed and destroyed as it was. This beautiful gift from the "Daughters of the Empire" in Brandon has made me very happy, and I thank you with all my heart. Will you please read this letter to these ladies whose names came to me with this gift, and say with what pride and gratitude I accept it and the Life Membership in the I.O.D.E. which they have honored me.

We shall be in Brandon every year for awhile and I hope to personally thank each one.
