ALICE LLOYD DELIGHTS AUDIENCE AT SHERMAN

Crowded House Greeted Famous Actress in Charming Operetta, "The Rose Maid."

"The Rose Maid" was most enthusiastically received Saturday by a crowded house at the Sherman Theatre. The presentation is a charming full of good music, good acting, beautiful costumes, and good staging. The Countess Bertrant, the champion of the young heiresses and who has a grievance against one of the loan brokers, decides to play a joke on them and passes off Daphne, daughter of the Duke's housekeeper as a wealthy American heiress. The Duke promptly falls in love with Daphne, which causes great consternation when it is learned that she is not rich. The story however, has a happy ending by the intervention of the bachelor uncle, who pays the Duke's debts, and Daphne and the Duke are married.

Miss Alice Lloyd, both as Daphne and later as the American heiress, with her charming vivacious manner, sang and acted her way into the hearts of the large audience. She was without doubt one of the most captivating actresses ever seen here. She has a sweet bell-like voice and brought down the house in her song hits, "Won't you Splash Me," "Ship Ahoy," "What are you getting at," "Hay," and "Another Pair of Stockings on the Line."

Miss Jeanette Bageard, in some strikingly handsome gowns, made a fascinating Countess Bertrant.

Princess Hilda was excellently portrayed by Miss Juliette Lange, who also sang delightfully.

Arthur Clough, as the Duke, is gifted with a remarkably fine voice and his singing of "Soldiers of Bohemia," "Sweethearts, Wives and Good Fellows," assisted by an exceptionally strong male chorus, was heartily enjoyed.

The character of Sir John, the bachelor uncle, was in the very able hands of Leo Stark, who created much merriment by his invention of a wife and baby boy to inherit his wealth, to the discomfiture of his nephew and his creditors.

H. Tyler Brooke, as "Bertie," the young cadet and Ada Van Time, as Gwendolyn of the susceptible affections were excellent, and sang and danced very pleasingly.

The humorists, Harry Mason, Edwin Clarke, and Harry Knowles, the loan brokers who, kept constantly appearing on the scene, kept the audience in tears of laughter with their clean, clever, yet "Harry" Mason, as "Schmuck," irresistible, and kept the audience convulsed with his original and extremely funny jokes.

The dancing of the chorus was brilliant, the music catchy and altogether it was quite the finest performance seen here this season.
