U. N. B. WON DEBATE FROM KINGS BOYS

Spirited Addresses by Repre-
sentatives of Both Institu-
tions—The Procedure
and Verdict.

The debate last evening in the
Opera House between Kings College,
Nova Scotia and U. N. B. was some-
what late in starting as the Kings
College debaters were delayed by the
recent storm and did not arrive in the
city until the evening train.

The late storm was also account-
able for the non-appearance of Gov-
ernor Tweedie, who was to act as
chairman of the debate, and his
place was taken by Dr. Inch, superin-
tendent of education.

A good sized audience was present
and while waiting for the debate to
begin were entertained by the City
Orchestra and college songs and yells
by the students.

The subject of the debate was: Re-
solved that a closer confederation of
the British Possessions in America
would be mutually beneficial. Kings
had the affirmative and U. N. B. the
negative.

The judges were J. D. Hazen, M.
P. P. Hon. C. W. Robinson and H.
W. Sangster, B. A., LL.B., of Wind-
sor.

The visitors were accompanied by
President Boudin of Kings.

The leader of the affirmative, Mr.
S. E. Tobin, in opening the debate,
laid stress upon the fact that the ten-
dency of the times was towards con-
federation in both the political and
business world, and argued that a
closer union of all the British pro-
vinces would be beneficial both as
regards the growth of the colonies
and also from a financial standpoint.

Mr. S. L. Orchard then followed,
and in opening the debate for U. N. B.
he showed that the distance between
the different colonies would be a dis-
advantage to any such union and
also that the race question would en-
ter largely into such a question as
the union of the colonies.

Mr. Orchard went on to show that if
such confederation were made, it
would be the means of opening up
questions of fisheries, etc., with the
United States, which would tend to
destroy the good feeling which pre-
vails at the present time between
Canada and the United States.

The second speaker for Kings, Mr.
Sikery, went on to show that the
distance between the different colonies
was no hindrance to such a union
as trade could be carried on by steam-
boat lines, which would be an impetus
to the ship-building trade. He pointed
out that the increase in trade would
be so great that in a short time the
confederation would be able to build
and maintain a navy from money de-
rived from the increased trade.

Mr. Hayward then took up the de-
bate for U. N. B. and pointed out
that the confederation would be un-
able to market the goods produced
within the union by trading amongst
themselves and would therefore have
to seek outside markets.

He also went on to show that re-
presentation by population in such a
union would be almost impossible
and the differences in the tariffs
would be enough to stop any such
confederation.

The last speaker for Kings, Mr.
Marell, pointed out that a closer
union between Newfoundland and
Canada would mean a great increase
in Canada's trade and that she would
then be able to present to the United
States a solid front in regard to all
tariff disputes. Continuing he said
that the people of Newfoundland
would derive a benefit inasmuch as
the cost of living would be decreased.

He also said that such a union of the
British Colonies in America would
lead towards the independence of the
colonies and the building up of a
nation which would be regarded with
greater respect by the nations of the
world.

Mr. M. L. Orchard, the leader, then
took up the debate for the U. N. B.
and confined himself largely to the
financial side of the question. He
pointed out the public debt in regard
to the different colonies and showed
that if such a union should be brought
about the debt of some of the smaller
colonies would be increased and thus
impose a burden upon the people
who would be unable to bear it.

Mr. Orchard then continued and in
a very forcible address closed the de-
bate for U. N. B.

His summing up and rebuttal were
especially good.

He was followed by the leader of
the negative, Mr. Tobin, who closed
the debate in a well pointed speech.
The decision of the question was then
left to the judges who retired to make
their calculations. On returning they
announced their individual decisions
to the chairman, who said that ac-
cording to the rules of the debate 662
points were given for argument and
38.3 for delivery.

On argument U. N. B. made 685
points and Kings 717.
On delivery U. N. B. made 273 and
Kings 216.

Thus he awarded the decision to
the U. N. B. debaters by a total of
958 points against 933 for Kings. The
decision was received with great
manifestation of joy by the students.

The debate was highly interesting
and instructive, the sides acquitting
themselves exceedingly well.

Executive hall. After full justice
had been done to the tempting

posed, Mr. Pinney performing the
duties of toastmaster in a most able
and pleasing manner.

name of His Worship the Mayor.
3. The Judges, Replied to by Mr.
Sangster and Mr. Robinson.
4. The Visitors, Coupled with the
name of S. E. Tobin, the leader
of Kings team.
5. The U. N. B. Debaters, Coupled
with the name of Mr. M. S. L. Or-
chard.
6. Kings University, Replied to by
President Boudin.
7. Our Alma Mater, Replied to
by Dr. Jones and Dr. Bailey.

The speeches were all well read-
ed and well received and a most
pleasant time was spent. After the
singing of Auld Lang Syne the gath-
ering broke up at an early hour this
morning, all unanimous in the opin-
ion that the Intercollegiate Debate
of 1907 would so dwarf in college an-
nals as one of the most pleasant and
interesting affairs of the kind for
many years.
