JACK DEMPSEY IS COMING TO N. B.

Heavyweight Champion to Hunt at Clarendon in October With Jack Doran

Jack Dempsey, heavyweight pugilistic champion, who is now preparing to defend his world title against Tom Gibbons at Shelby, Montana, on July 4th, is coming to New Brunswick to hunt moose next autumn.

Jack Doran, one of New Brunswick's best known guides, received a communication last evening from Walter D. Hinds, Portland, Me., business man and sportsman, who is at Dempsey's training camp at Great Falls, Montana, stating that the champion is planning to be at Doran's hunting camps at Clarendon the first week in October.

Mr. Hinds brought Dempsey to New Brunswick on a hunting trip last fall, incidentally visiting the Maine woods on the same trip. It is expected that a large retinue of sporting celebrities will come to New Brunswick with the world's pugilistic champion, who evidently is planning to spend some of the \$300,000—which is his "bit" of the Shelby event—on enjoying himself. He declared on his last visit to New Brunswick that moose hunting is the king of sports.

FREDERICTON WILL HAVE RACES IN JULY

\$3,100 Offered by Fredericton Driving and Sporting Club for July 18 and 19

While Fredericton is not to have any Dominion Day racing this year, the Fredericton Driving and Sporting Club have prepared a programme for a midsummer race meeting on July 18th and 19th which promises to bring the leading racing stables campaigning this season in both the Maritime Provinces and Maine together. It will be regular Maine and New Brunswick Circuit meeting and, as with many Fredericton meetings in the past, is expected to bring the racing clans together for the first time in the season. Included in the programme are two free for alls—The Pacing Main, which will bring John R. Braden, 2.02 3/4, the Grattans and Dan Hedgewood, 2.04 together; and the Junior Free for All which will give Roy Volo, 2.08 1/4, a chance to do battle with his old rivals.

The complete programme for the two days' racing follows:

Wednesday, July 18.—Free for All, Barker House Purse \$1,000; 2.19 trot and pace, and 2.23 trot.

Thursday, July 19.—Junior Free for All for 2.09 Pacers, Purse \$500; 2.15 trot and pace and 2.25 pace.

The grandstand at the Trotting Park is being moved to a position somewhat nearer the track than it has formerly occupied so as to give the spectators a better view of the home stretch, and is also being renovated. Boxes will be provided and the seats in the stand, as well as the boxes, will be reserved for race meetings in the future, thus making a marked improvement for the patrons. Whole-hearted support of the sporting public is necessary to make such an elaborate programme as the Fredericton Driving and Sporting Club have arranged to keep Fredericton on the racing map during the summer and the executive hope that a large number of citizens will renew their membership in the organization when an authorized agent calls during the next few days to collect the annual membership fee of \$2.
