### DOYLE AND CAMERON RE-INSTATED.

I. C. R. Conductor John F. Doyle and Locomotive Engineer Harry C. Cameron, who have been under suspension for several months on account of the Beaver Brook disaster, have both been re-instated. Mr. R. Harry Smith, I. C. R. legal investigator, who conducted the inquiry at Campbellton, made a lengthy and exhaustive report of the case from the evidence adduced, and gave it as his legal opinion that the conductor and engineer were "working off the order" and were not guilty of any wrong doing or neglect of duty, and recommended their re-instatement. Deputy Minister Butler, to whom the report was forwarded, sustained Mr. Smith's decision by ordering the re-instatement of both the suspended employees. Mr. Cameron will run on specials east and west, and Conductor Doyle will resume his old position on the northern division.

### LEFT OVER \$100,000

The will of the late Hon. A. G. Blair, has been admitted to probate at Ottawa. It is understood that the estate, a considerable part of which is in life insurance, is worth more than \$100,000.

**The Dominion King's Printer.** Dr. S. E. Dawson, King's Printer, and Comptroller of Stationery for the Dominion, who has recently been honored with a C.M.G., is one of the best known and most honored of the public servants at the capital. He is a son of the late Rev. B. Dawson of the Reformed Episcopal Church. Born at Halifax on June 1, 1833, and educated at McGill's school in that city, he early entered the book-selling and stationery business in connection with his father. Afterwards the firm became Dawson Bros. In 1879 Mr. Dawson aided in the founding of the Dominion Bank Note Company, and one year later of the Montreal News Company. In 1881 he was appointed a delegate to Washington to confer on the subject of international copyright. He was long a member of the Board of Protestant school commissioners in Montreal, and for a time was President of the Board of Arts and Manufactures of the Province of Quebec. He was appointed to his present position in 1891, and has fulfilled his duties with credit and honor. Dr. Dawson has been a frequent contributor to the Canadian periodicals, and was one of the earliest writers for the Canadian Monthly. His best-known work is an appreciative study of Tennyson's "The Princess."

**No Hindu Cremation in B.C.** Unable to secure permission from the Canadian officials to cremate their dead according to their religious beliefs, the Hindu residents of Western Canada are sending their dead to Seattle, Wash., for cremation. After cremation, the dust is scattered over the sea. According to the Hindu rites, the dead body must be covered with brush, and burned until not even the bones remain. The Canadian officials are having considerable trouble with these Originals, who are now flooding British Columbia. The latter are again taking up the matter with the officials in regard to the erection of a Hindu crematory, but there is small chance of success. They say that the cremation system used in Seattle is not in accordance with their religion.

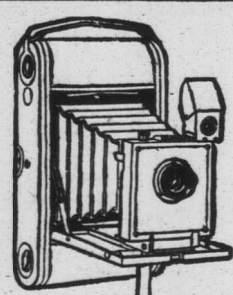
### Public Health.

Notice is hereby given to all owners and occupiers of dwellings within the Town of Campbellton, to have their respective premises, including House Yards, Back Yards, Cellars, Outbuildings and all other Appurtenances connected therein, thoroughly cleansed and disinfected to the satisfaction of the Board of Health on or before Saturday, May 11th, 1907. Commencing Monday, May 13th, John Duncan, Sanitary Inspector of the Board of Health, will make a personal inspection of all premises within the town and in all the cases where the above order has not been complied with, prompt action will be taken and the law rigorously enforced.

The Public Dumping Ground for all kinds of refuse or other material is situated as formerly, near the end of the mill creek bridge. For the convenience of the public however, refuse material, free from anything of an offensive nature, may be deposited in the crib work near Mr. Kelly's blacksmith shop. Any person found guilty of dumping any kind of refuse, or other material, at any other place or under conditions than those specified above will be prosecuted as the law directs.
