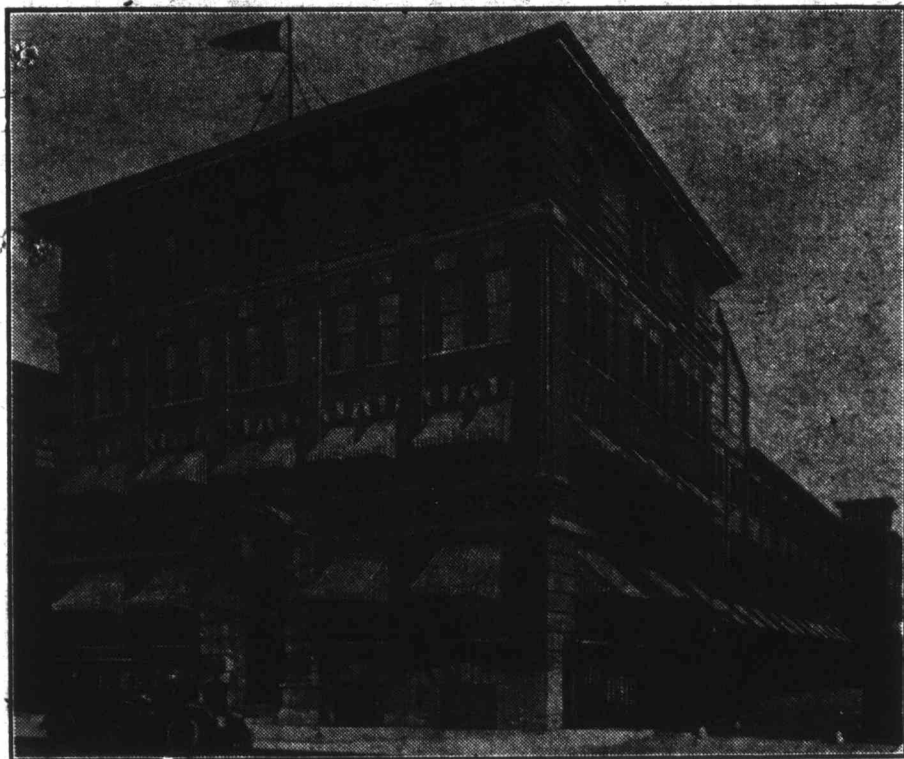


THE THREE LARGEST TEA WAREHOUSES IN THE WORLD

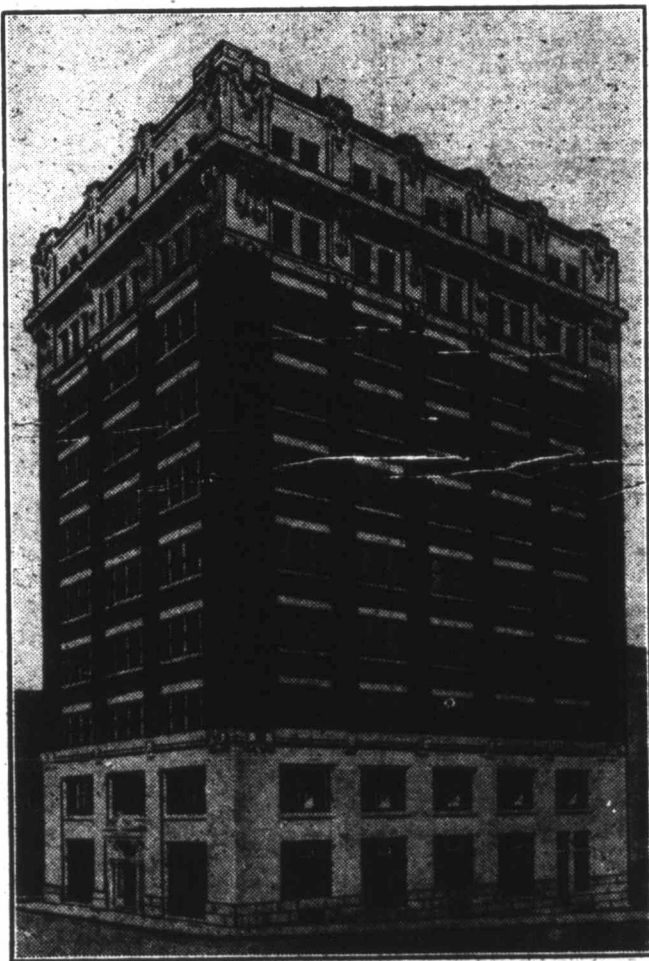

Urge Respect For National Anthem

At the meeting of the National Executive of the I. O. O. F. held recently at headquarters, Toronto, Miss Jean Arnold in the chair, Mrs. Buckner brought in the following resolution:

that at the theatre and cinema insufficient respect is shown to the playing of the National Anthem, the managers of the movies be asked to throw on the screen the request that patrons should stand at attention until the last bar is played."

BIG INCREASE IN BANK NOTES OUT

Ottawa, Nov. 17—In consequence of the crop movement and the financial

operations incidental thereto, Dominion notes in circulation increased by nearly \$17,000,000 during the past four weeks, while the amount of gold held has slightly decreased. A month ago note circulation was \$303,065,876, against \$320,012,915 today. Gold held a month ago \$96,205,901 against \$95,222,901 held today. Securities deposited a month ago \$149,680,125 against \$166,715,125 today.

\$11,000,000 Timber Deal Dragging

The immense transaction, involving the purchase of the New Brunswick Railway Company's timber lands at approximately \$11,000,000 which was to have been completed by the Fraser Companies, Limited, recently has not yet been closed. Archibald Fraser said this morning that the consummation of the deal had been "postponed" and added that "no big deals are being put through just now." For continuing the option which they have on the New Brunswick Company's lands the Fraser interests have been paying \$25,000 a month for some time now.

Possible Successor to Inspector Wilson

St. John, Nov. 21—It was persistently rumored about the city today that Sheriff Hawthorne, of York County, was slated to succeed Rev. W. D. Wilson as chief liquor inspector of New Brunswick.

When queried on the subject, Sheriff Hawthorne admitted he had been interviewed on the matter, that he was not advised to accept the job, assuming he would be permitted to continue on as sheriff, but he had no official assurance that the appointment was counting his way.
