Col. Otter, Lieut. Col. Buchan, Lt. Col. Ryerson, Major Macdougall, Capt. Macdonald, Capt. Barker, Capt. Mason, Lts. Temple and Wilkie, Rev. Father O'Leary and war correspondents Hamilton, Brown and Ewan were guests of honor at a public banquet held at Toronto, Thurs day night attended by the governor gen eral, Premier Ross, Postmaster Genera Mulock and many other prominent men. The guests of the evening were given a great ovation when their health was pro-

posed. The governor general praised most highly the work of Col. Otter, his old comrade in arms of the Northwest rebeland pointed out how difficult it was to neet guerilla tactics. No European na
