Jamestown, N.D., July 12.—Seven-hundred strikers, from a Northern Pacific freight train at Oakes, arrived here today and refused to either pay their fare or leave the train. The crew was unable to put the men off and the train left for Jamestown yesterday carrying about 180 men. They immediately scattered in all directions.
