

Special to Evening Telegram. ST. PETERSBURG, Nov. 1. Emperor Nicholas to-day approved a resolution adopted by the Cabine opening up new sections for the resi lence of Jews. Heretofore the legal residence of Jews has been restricted to that section of the Polish Province and the Ukraino, by the original Jewish law and known as the Pale. Imperial, consent is now given to the unrestricted residence of Jews in 12 districts in the Provinces of Vitebesk Volhynia, Mohilev, Poltava and Phea son and the town of Yukaterinodo the Capital of Kubal.
