Girl Sprints Her Way to \$70,000 Fortune.

Vassar Student Beat Five Other Girls in a Foot Race and Won 1,000 Shares of Mining Stock.

Chicago, Ill., July 15.—That it pays to be a good sprinter, even for one of the fair sex, was proven yesterday, when Miss Caroline Cantlon, a Chicago girl, learned that a little foot race she won three years ago from five girls in Calgary, Alberta, has been the means of making her the owner of mining stock valued at \$70,000.

Miss Cantlon, when in college, devoted more time to athletics than to study. Before graduating from Vassar she had become the fastest runner in the college.

This year after leaving school she went to Calgary to visit some of her college chums. The provincial fair was being held at that time, and one of the big events was a half mile run for girls.

Miss Cantlon and two of her school girl chums entered the race against three other Calgary girls.

Just before the race was called a young Calgary millionaire "cattle dealer" stepped forward and said he would give a prize of a diamond bracelet to the winner. Before the girls' screams of delight had subsided another young Calgary millionaire mine owner declared he would add another prize to the winner, a certificate of 1,000 shares of stock in a British Columbia mining company.

When the outburst of yells, catcalls and laughter had subsided it was explained to Miss Cantlon that the mine was looked upon as worthless and had never paid any dividends, although at one time considered a winner. She met her friends' laughs at the mining stock with the statement that it was at least a pretty bit of paper and she would keep it for a souvenir.

Yesterday Miss Cantlon learned that the mine had been taken over by new management and had been made one of the best paying properties in Western Canada. Stock is selling at \$70 a share. Miss Cantlon's 1,000 shares are worth just \$70,000, with prospects of it reaching \$200,000 soon.

Clergy Change Marriage Form.

Objections Raised to Certain Phrases in Ceremony—Keen Debates.

London, July 12.—It has long been suggested that the form of marriage service of the Church of England is unsuitable to the present day decorum in speech, and at last action has been taken by the Lower House of Convocation at a meeting held in the Church House at Westminster.

"It was suggested that one clause should be altered to read: 'It is not by any to be taken in hand inadvisedly, lightly, or wantonly, but reverently, discreetly, advisedly, soberly and in the fear of God.'"

"There is a great deal too much prudery about in the twentieth century," said Canon Rhodes Tristram in proposing the proposed alteration.

Canon Henson, supporting the proposal, said prudery was a bad thing, and the sixteenth century, from which this particular exhortation came, was a coarse age. After discussion, the alteration was agreed to.

Household Notes.

I know a woman who always keeps a small piece of whetstone in her machine drawer for sharpening needles when they become blunted. It is a great scheme and saves a lot of needles, as I have proved to my own satisfaction.

Here is a suggestion for easily ironing a bonnet with a drawing iron by it, clip the string or tape at one side and fasten a small safety pin in it. Smooth out the fullness, letting the pin and string slip back in the casing. When froned take hold of the pin and run it out.

An excellent treatment for shoes that have been rubbed is to rub vasoline well into the leather when nearly dry. This will do wonders toward removing the bad effects of the wetting, and prevent the shoes from cracking or becoming hard and uncomfortable to the feet.

I have many a headache during the summer, and have at last found the reason for them: the strong sunlight hurts my eyes. I have learned to wear dark blue glasses while doing many tasks out of doors, such as hanging up the clothes, sprinkling the lawn, etc., and have secured relief from the practice.

Many rust spots on clothes are caused by bits of soap adhering to the latter when they come in contact with the bluing water. The discovery has been of great help to me because I can now easily avoid having these unsightly marks. I merely cut the soap into small pieces and tie them in a salt bag I keep for the purpose.

People wearing eyeglasses find it very annoying when the glass steams and gets frosted. To prevent this, take any good glycerine soap rub a little on each side of the glass (use no water), then polish with tissue paper or a soft cloth. It removes grease and grime, also stays polished much longer than with the ordinary cleaning.

Before putting my corset cover into the wash I tie a piece of ordinary white tape as long as the ribbon to one end and pull out the ribbon at the other; that leaves the tape in while the cover is laundered. When the ribbon is ready to put it on, just tie the ribbon to one end of the tape and pull out the tape. You will find that your ribbon is in smoother and quicker.

The following is a fine lustrous polish for furniture: Half-pint of linseed oil, half-pint of old ale, the white of an egg, one ounce spirits of wine. Shake well before using. A little to be applied to face of soft linen pad and lightly rubbed for a minute or two over the article to be restored, which should first be rubbed with an old silk handkerchief. If well worked it will keep any length of time.
