### Cable News.

WASHINGTON, June 3.  
The House of Representatives today passed a bill designed to protect American shipping and commerce against the alleged monopoly of a so-called foreign shipping trust. In introducing the bill, it was stated that 90 per cent. of all shipping entering American ports was in foreign pools, and no competition existed. Refusal of clearance papers to trust ships, refusing entry to American ports, and the imposition of heavy fines or the confiscation of such vessels, are among the penalties provided for. The proposed measure would also empower the Postmaster General to cancel mail contracts with vessels that are parties to the pool, or otherwise committed to restrain trade.

NEW YORK, June 3.  
Capt. Rostron, of the Carpathia, was presented with a draft for \$10,000 to-day, a fund subscribed by New York Americans. The presentation took place aboard the liner. Rostron, in accepting the gift, stated that whatever part he played in the Titanic tragedy was due to the loyalty of his crew. It grieved him, he said, to know that honours were being thrust upon him rather than others. The largest contributor was Mrs. Widener, of Philadelphia, whose husband perished on the Titanic. She gave \$2,500.

NEWARK, New Jersey, June 3.  
A pitched battle between 500 rioting labourers and the entire police force and fire department of Kearney suburb was fought in the main street of the town to-day. During a preliminary skirmish the labourers felled the chief of police with a stone, and pursued him to a vacant house, from which he opened fire upon them. The rioters bombarded the house with stones until the reserves arrived. Two rioters were shot, one fatally. The strikers were routed by the combined forces of bluecoats and firemen. Many arrests were made.

LONDON, June 3.  
It is estimated that 110,000 men are idle along the Thames and Medway rivers this morning. In some cases applicants for work have been roughly handled by pickets. With the exception of the dockers, all the strikers are now receiving strike pay. The position of the dockers is becoming very serious, pawnbrokers refusing to accept further pledges unless the strike is speedily ended. This will mean semi-starvation to many residents of the riverside.

WASHINGTON, June 3.  
President Taft sent the following message to King George to-day: "On this anniversary of your birth, I extend to your Majesty, in the name of the Government and people of the United States, hearty congratulations, and our sincere wish for your personal health and happiness, and for the continued prosperity of the Empire over which you reign."

LONDON, June 3.  
A London cable to the Montreal Star says that the early withdrawal of Premier Asquith to the House of Lords is now accepted as absolutely assured, and it is not at all unlikely that he will at the same time relinquish the leadership of the Government and the Liberal Party. His most likely successor is said to be Winston Churchill.

BERLIN, June 3.  
At a banquet alluding to his appointment as Ambassador to London, Baron von Bieherstein said, "My path is steep and stony, but faithful to my imperial master's orders, I will devote my whole strength to it." Baron von Bieherstein is credited with a mission to improve Anglo-German relations.

LONDON, June 3.  
Many honours will be showered on the Prince of Wales when he attains his eighteenth birthday on June 23rd. It is understood that he will be promoted to the rank of lieutenant in the navy, and receives a commission in the army. In due course the Prince will be made Knight of the Thistle, and Knight of St. Patrick.

LONDON, June 3.  
It is reported that a mutiny has broken out in the Turkish Navy. A portion of the navy, stung by newspaper reproaches of inactivity, demanded that the Government order the vessels to fight. This was refused and the crews mutinied.

ATHENS, June 3.  
Italian forces have occupied the Turkish island of Phara in the Aegean Sea. The island is entirely inhabited by Greeks.
