

An amount totalling between \$155,000,000 and \$175,000,000 in bank securities, bonds and stocks of over forty public utility companies is involved in the failure of J. S. and W S. Kuhn, of Pittsburg, through the suspension of the First Second National Bank of Pittsburg and the First National Bank of Makeysport, Pa., which they controlled, and the Great American Waterworks Guar antee Company, one of the mos ugely capitalized concerns in the ountry, which the Kuhns also conrolled. The size of the amounts of money at stake astounded Wall St In the memory of banking men here the suspension of the First Second National Bank alone is said to be one of the largest, if not a recor size of failure. It has liabilities close to \$40,000,000, with \$3,400,000 capital
