## Says He Saw Crucified Canadian

Victim Belonged to Medical Corps and Maltreated Were Second Prussian Guards.

London, June 1.—Private George Barrie, Thirteenth Royal Highlanders, who was wounded, but expects to return immediately, says he was one who helped to take down the body of the Canadian who had been crucified by the Germans in the fighting round Ypres. The victim, says Barrie, was a Sergeant of the medical service. From letters on him, he appeared to be from Brantford, Ontario. Barrie says he lost the sergeant's pay-book and letters in thrusting through barbed wire entanglements. The victim was about twenty-four years old. He was found with one Rose rifle bayonet through the left shoulder, also a Lee-Enfield bayonet through the legs and directly through the lower parts of the body. The maltreated were the Second Prussian Guards.

**STOP PUBLICATION OF CASUALTY LISTS.**  
Berlin, via London, June 11.—The military commandant in Berlin has issued a renewal of the order prohibiting the publication or communication of military information without a previously granted order. He says the publication of German losses, although based on official lists, "could lay no claim to correctness and in part gave greatly exaggerated figures. Publications of this nature are calculated to evoke groundless uneasiness among the people and also occasion incorrect ideas abroad concerning German losses." The commandant, therefore, forbids the publication of all such articles.

## Germans Persecute Belgians.

New York, June 10.—A special cable to the New York Herald from Paris says:

"Everywhere throughout Belgium the Germans are rebuking their severity. They suspect the Belgian population of favoring the national cause. At Liege fourteen persons were shot. At Brussels a fireworks maker named Ricard was shot for having struck a German."

"At Edoe a student was condemned to eight days in prison and \$100 fine for wearing a French tricolor cockade in his hat. Posters in Antwerp notify Belgians that they can obtain German naturalization within forty-eight hours."

"A letter from Ghent gives details of the arrest of the young Comtesse Joughe-Ardoye. With her grandmother she was walking on the Boulevard wearing a medallion with the portrait of King Albert."

Officer rushed at her and tore off the medallion crying: "Down with this King without a country!"

"The Countess picked up the jewelry and replied: 'We Belgians prefer a King without a country to an Emperor without honor.' The two women were arrested."

REFUSE TO TAKE PASTOR SNYDER.

Brantford, Ont., June 11.—The action of the Hamilton conference of the Methodist church stationing committee, in re-appointing Rev. A. I. Snyder as pastor of the Sydenham Street Methodist Church here, meets with anything but approval from the officials of the church. The appointment will not be accepted by the officials. While no definite charge has been laid by the members of the Board, nor is such a charge likely to be laid, it is alleged that Rev. Mr. Snyder has been taking a pro-German stand in the pulpit. Recently he is alleged to have declared that he has been reading the German official books and he firmly believes that Britain did not enter into the conflict with clean hands. The officials state that their word is final, and that they will withdraw from all positions in the church unless the change is made.

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## New Italian Flier TO DESTROY ZEPPELINS.

Gigantic Double Aeroplane Perfected for Attacking Dirigible Airships.

Rome, June 10.—An aeroplane destroyer designed for attacking dirigible airships has been perfected in Italian government workshops during the past few months. It is an enormous machine, with three separate engines, and with a total energy of 250 horse power. The aeroplane combines the tractor and pusher type of machines—that is, those which are drawn along by an air screw in front, and those which are pushed by an air screw behind.

It consists, in fact, of the bodies of two ordinary tractor biplanes, placed side by side and far enough apart so that there is room between them for the propeller of a third engine. Each of the two main bodies has its own engine and tractor screw in front, so that it looks at first like two ordinary tractor biplanes flying hand in hand.

On the section of wing which joins the two bodies is placed the body work of an ordinary pusher biplane, with the engine and propeller behind. In this way the body projects well forward in front of the screws of the other two engines, so that it can carry a gun of considerable size and have a clear field of fire forward, backward and on both sides without danger of hitting its own screws or wings.

The tail end of the two bodies are joined together by a very large tail stretching from one end to the other, so that actually all parts of the machine are in proportion.

The big machine is capable of lifting a huge cargo of bombs large enough to be certain to destroy a Zeppelin if they hit it, and even capable of doing serious damage to a battleship.

TO MAKE GAS IN MIDAIR.

New Zeppelin Has Three Tanks and Manufacturing Apparatus.

London, June 10.—The Daily Mail's correspondent at Copenhagen sends further details of the new type of Zeppelin constructed for carrying poisonous gases. The new airship, he says, has three tanks carrying these gases below the navigating chamber and also apparatus for manufacturing the gases in the air.

The crew is smaller than those of the old Zeppelins. The speed is much greater. It is reported in Copenhagen that the new type of airship already have been built.

The new Zeppelins use aerial torpedoes made of aluminum and filled with gas, which sustains them, while they are directed by other waves and exploded at any point. They can be directed from a great distance by this means.

Mystery Solved.

SUSPECT ADMITS THEFT.

A fisherman of Salvage, B.B., who was arrested on a charge of stealing \$380 from the store of the Martin Hardware Co., last autumn, was arraigned before Judge Macdonald yesterday afternoon and pleaded guilty to the charge. SHORT-LIVED GUNS.

"Supposing that an incessant stream of projectiles was fired from a twelve-inch gun, extreme old age would come, and it would be worn out in two seconds." This interesting statement was made at the Royal Institution recently by Lieut.-Col. Haddock, when speaking on "Modern Artillery." These huge weapons, he said, looked everlasting, but they only "lived" when they were being fired, and therefore their lives were extremely short, shorter than that of a butterfly, which lived to the great old age of twenty-four hours. Despite anti-aircraft guns the safest place on the battlefields, declared Lieut.-Col. Haddock, was in an aeroplane.
