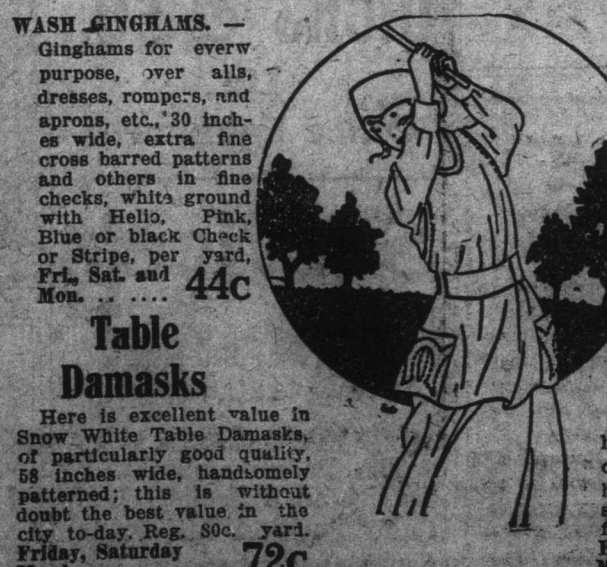

Magistrate's Court.

Timothy Dunn vs. Munroe Bishop.

This is a prosecution for a breach
of Section 3 of the Regulations made
under the provisions of the War Mea-
sures Act, 1914.

The defendant on Wednesday last at
9.30 p.m., while driving a motor car on
LeMarchant Road was stopped by the
complainant and charged with having
glaring headlights.

Section 3 of the Regulations sets
forth: "Head lights used on any
Motor Cars or Motor Cycles in or near
the city of St. John's, or in or near
any settlement in the District of St. John's
East or West, or on any road
approaching St. John's or any of the
said settlements, upon which lights
may be visible at sea, shall be so ad-
justed that the glare or upward re-
flection upon the heavens shall be re-
duced to fifty per cent of the normal."

The defendant states that after the
publication of the Regulations, July
3rd, last, he procured a set of "Legal-
ite Lens" so as to comply with the
law and he was using them on Wed-
nesday night when stopped by com-
plainant.

It is contended when using "Legal-
ite Lens" there is positively
no glare; the light beams are never
more than forty-two inches above the
ground at any distance.

Mr. Joseph Cocker, an expert with
twenty years experience as a motor-
ist, in his evidence, says: "The object
of the Legalite Lens is to take
away the blinding glare; the light is
curtailed considerably from the sky,
approximately the curtailment would
be about thirty or forty per cent." On
cross examination by Mr. Warren,
K.C., the witness would not swear
what percentage the glare or reflec-
tion was reduced. It may be more
than thirty or forty per cent. It was
merely an approximate opinion he
was giving.

There is a great variety of motor
cars in St. John's with different sys-
tems of lighting. The greatest num-
ber would be lit by Electric light,
which vary from two to twenty candle
power.

The Regulations do not define what
normal lighting is, or should be,
therefore, I have no standard to guide
me.

The defendant, by changing his
plain glass lens and using Legalite
lens, made a bona fide effort to com-
ply with the Regulations; and there is
no evidence before me that the lights
he was using on his motor car on
Wednesday night were not reduced to
fifty per cent of the normal. I there-
fore dismiss the complaint.

The Inspector General conducted
the prosecution. Mr. Warren, K.C.,
for the defendant.

Bootless Be.

London Daily Express: The citi-
zens of Berlin have been officially
warned that they must prepare to do
without boots. The summer has pass-
ed its zenith. The chill autumn days
will soon be with us, winter itself is
not far off, and Berlin in winter is a
bleak and chilly city. To wander
along Unter den Linden bootless on
a real North German cold day, will
be more than an uncomfortable ex-
perience. The open confession that
the Prussian high command has no
leather substitutes is proof sufficient
of the effective result of the block-
ade, and, too, of the fact that, unless
she can secure overseas supplies,
Germany will be industrially helpless
after the war. There never was a
time when England was so well shod
