Good Trap Fishing.

An extract from a letter received by the Assistant Collector of Customs from the Sub-Collector at Trinity says:—"I will give you a rough estimate of the traps set on the coast. As of the former place one trap took 160 qts. one trap 100, two traps 80 qts. each and others 20 qts; each. At Trouty one trap took 180 qts, another 100 qts. the remainder, except one which took 70 qts, average 16 qts. each. Every day the traps get empty of fish and the fishers say they are getting nice catches."
